To minimise the risk of identifying individuals, a technique known as perturbation has been applied to randomly adjust cells. For this reason, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals, and data may not match other published sources. Clients are assigned to only one region, based on the location details provided in their first support period in the reference year. #### 1) Number of hardship customers




#### 2) Average debt of hardship program participants







In accordance with nationally agreed reporting definitions, data for children in care refers to children placed with kin, other home-based carers or residential care services. Intake: Refers to the process by which Child Safety receives and gathers information about harm or risk of harm to a child or an unborn child who may be at risk of harm after he or she is born and determines the appropriate response to the information received. Intake processes are initiated when professionals, family members or members of the public contact Regional Intake Services or Child Safety Service Centres with concerns about a child. Notification: A notification is recorded where there is a reasonable suspicion that a child is in need of protection, that is, a child has been significantly harmed, is being significantly harmed, or is at risk of significant harm, and does not have a parent able and willing to protect them. Substantiated: The outcome of an investigation and assessment where it is assessed suffering, or is at unacceptable risk of suffering future,






