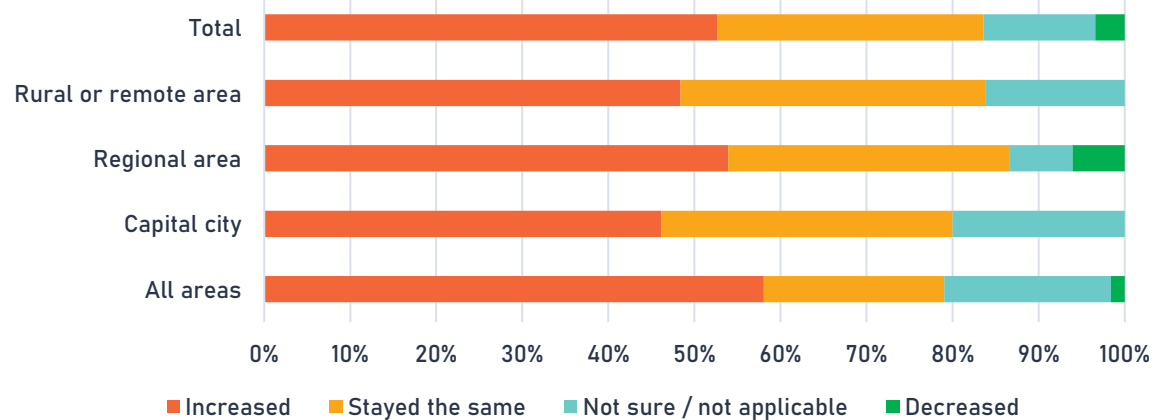

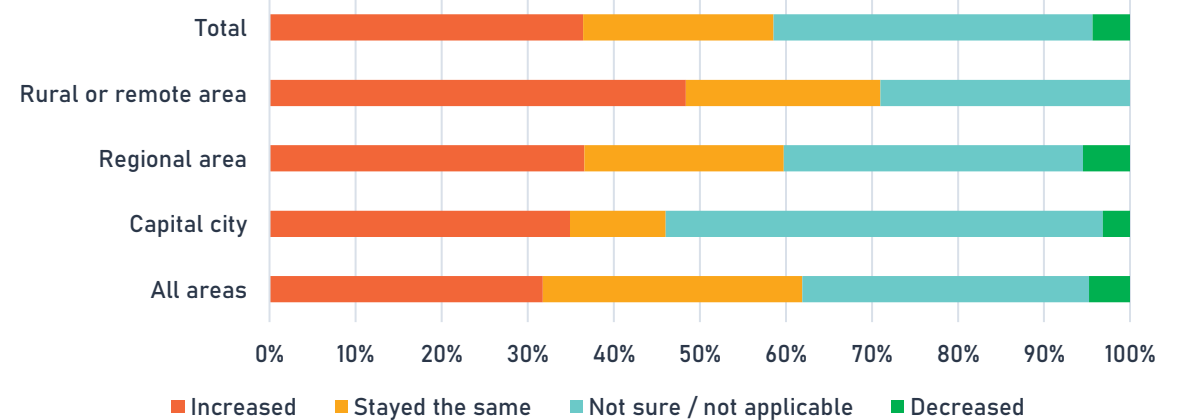

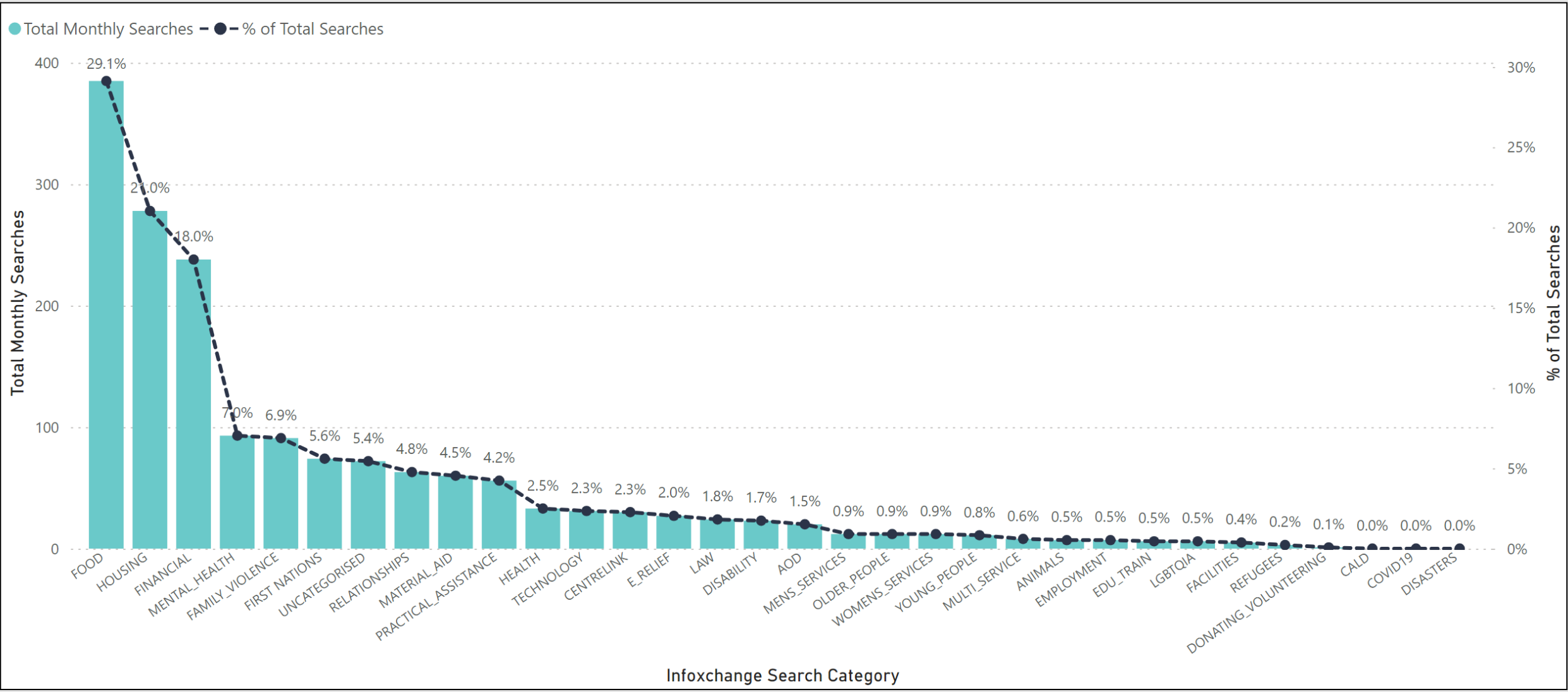

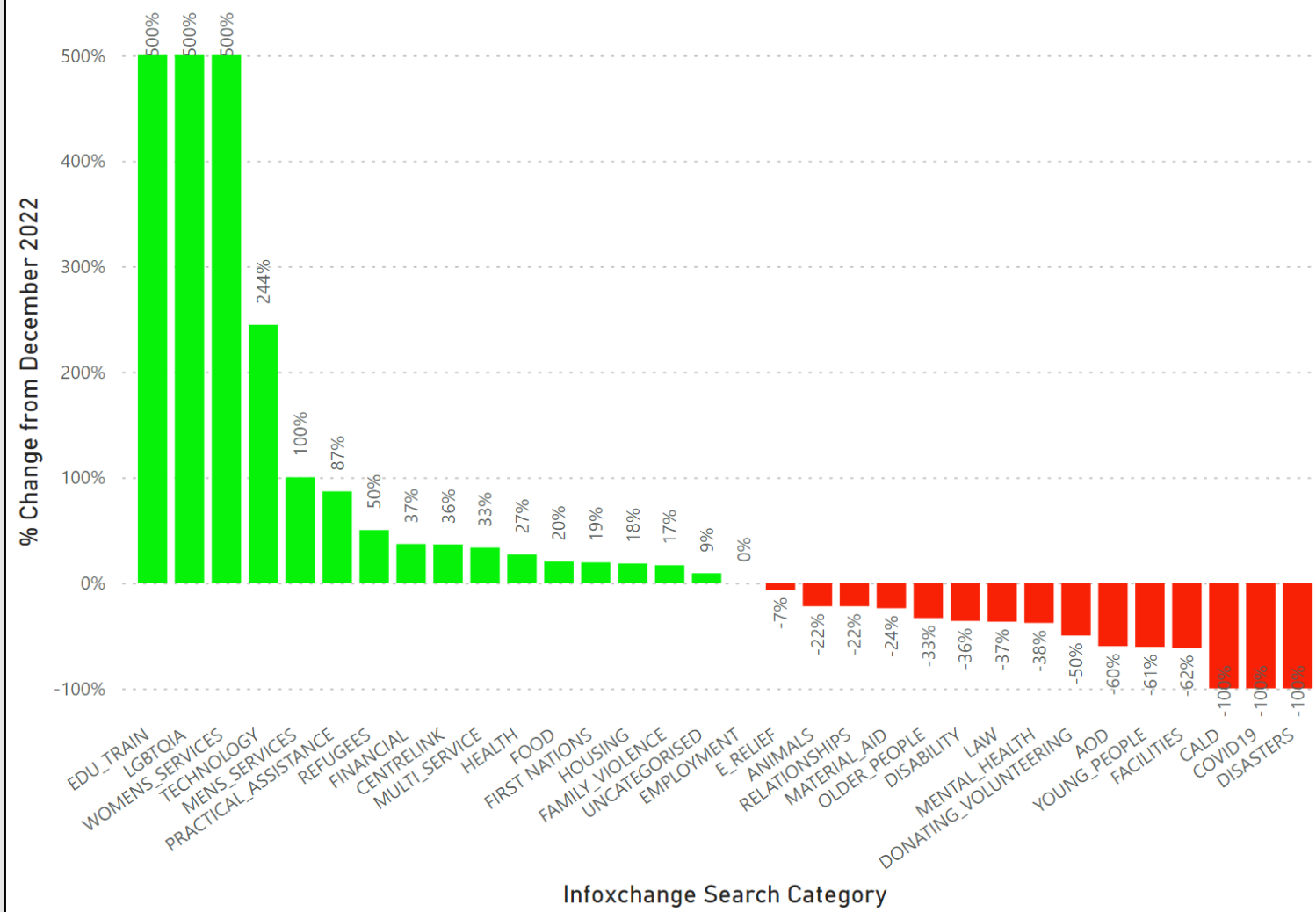

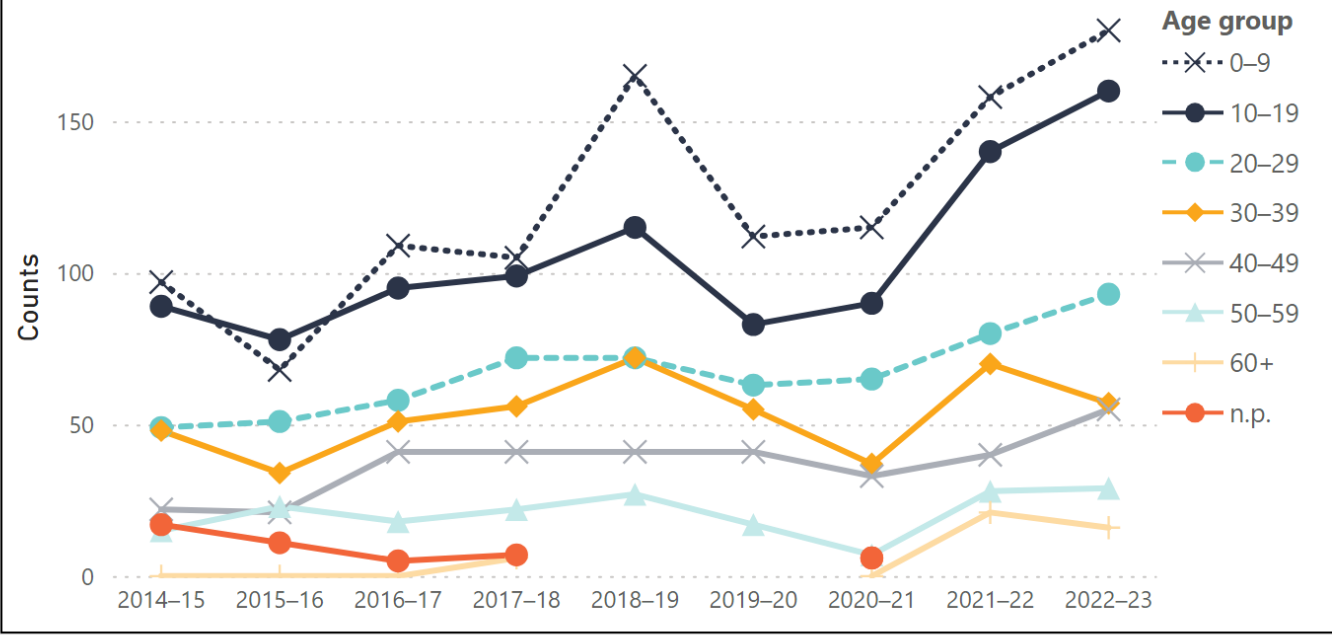

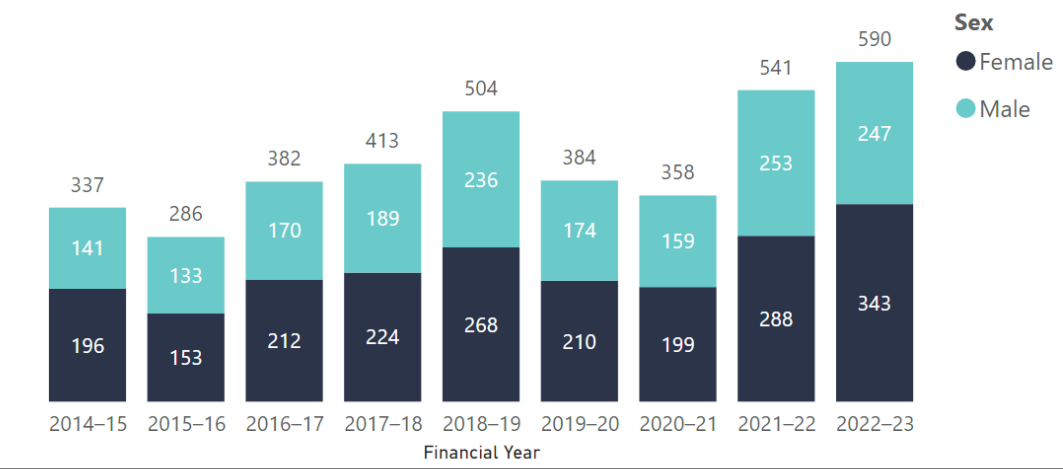
Count by Age group and Sex

To minimise the risk of identifying individuals, a technique known as perturbation has been applied to randomly adjust cells. Clients are assigned to only one region, based on the location details provided in their first support period in the reference year. 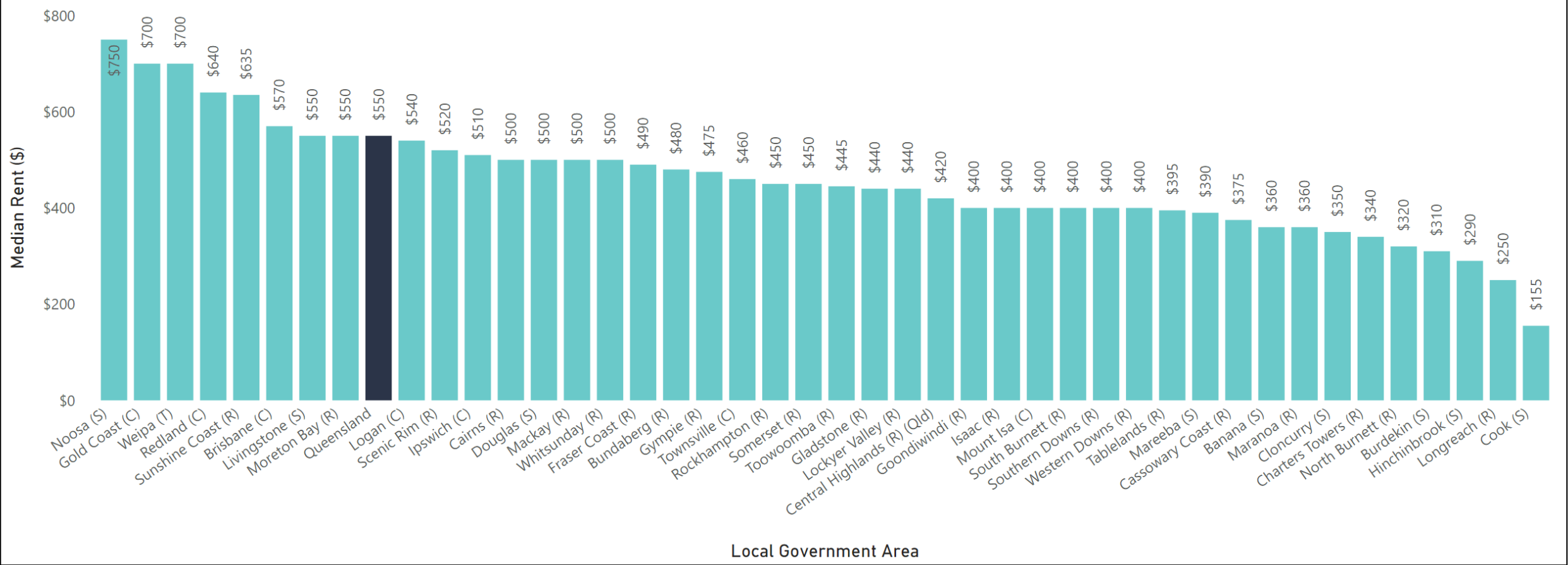

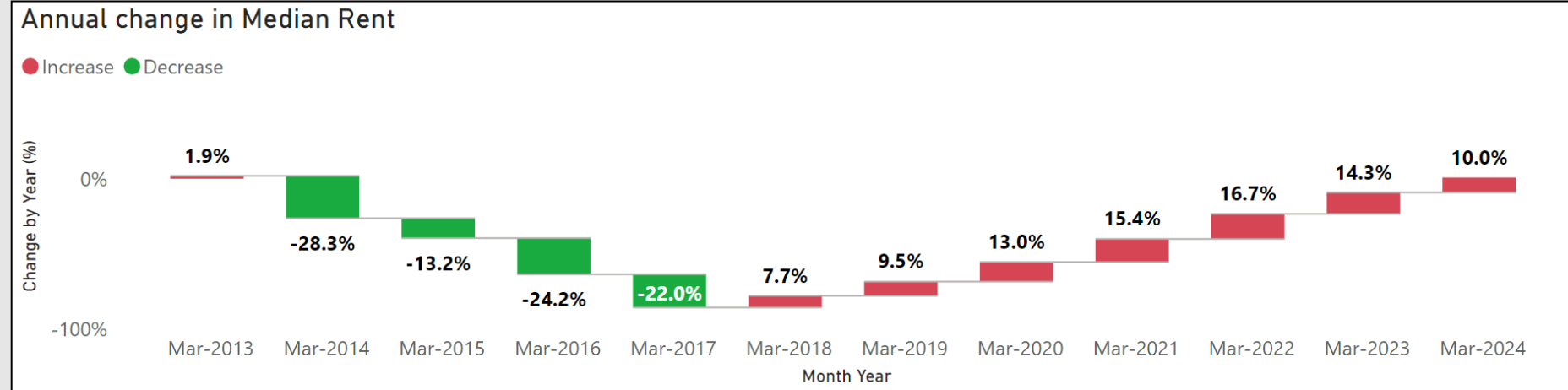

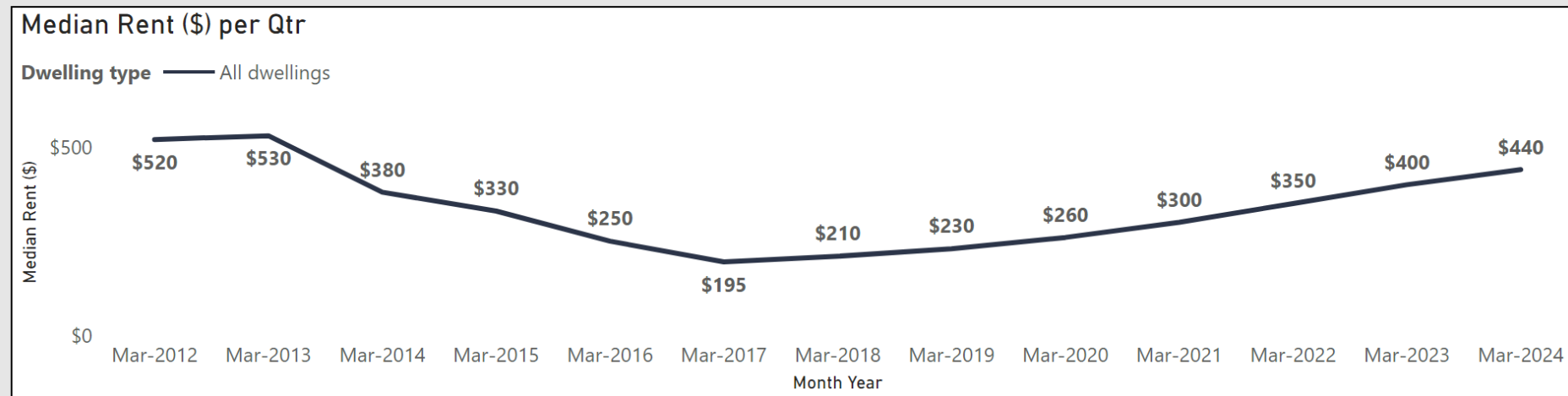

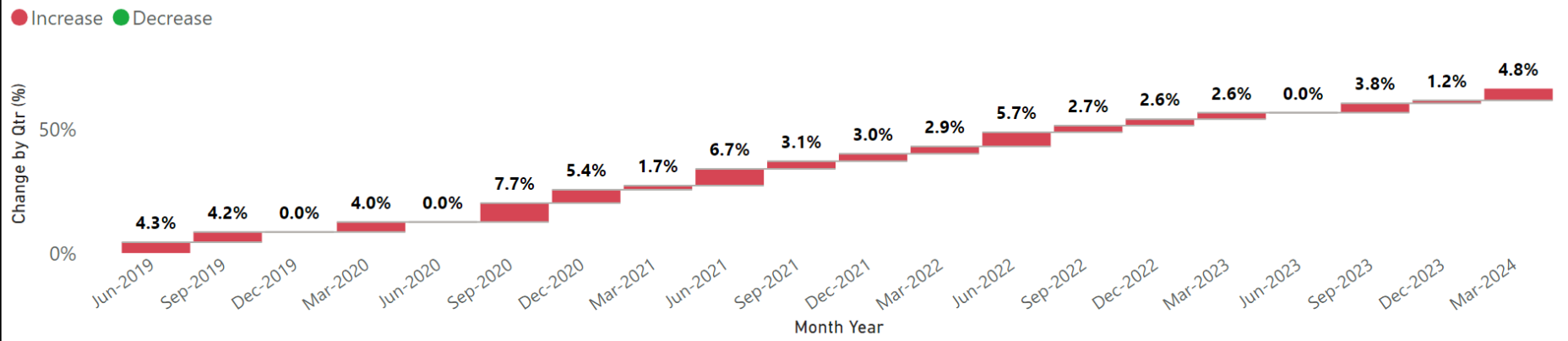

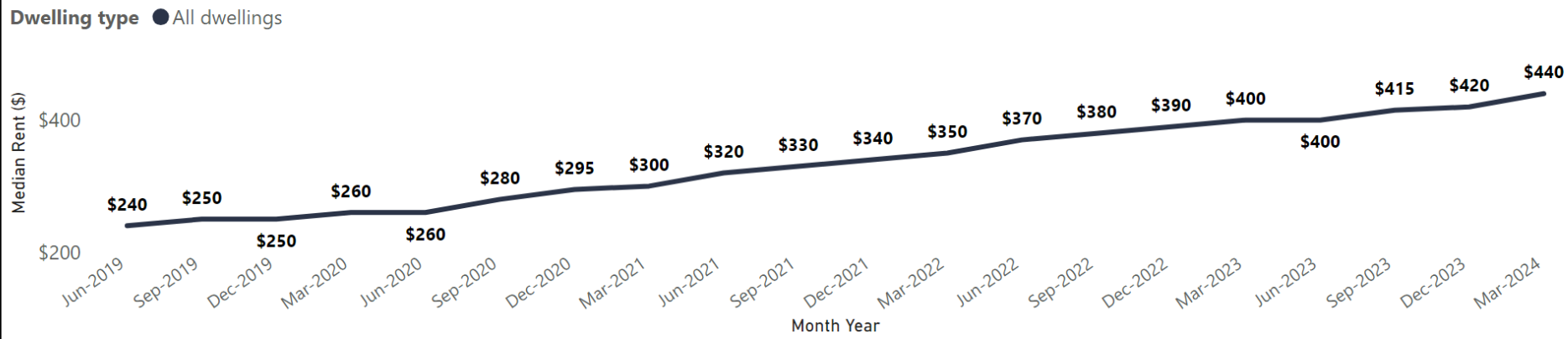

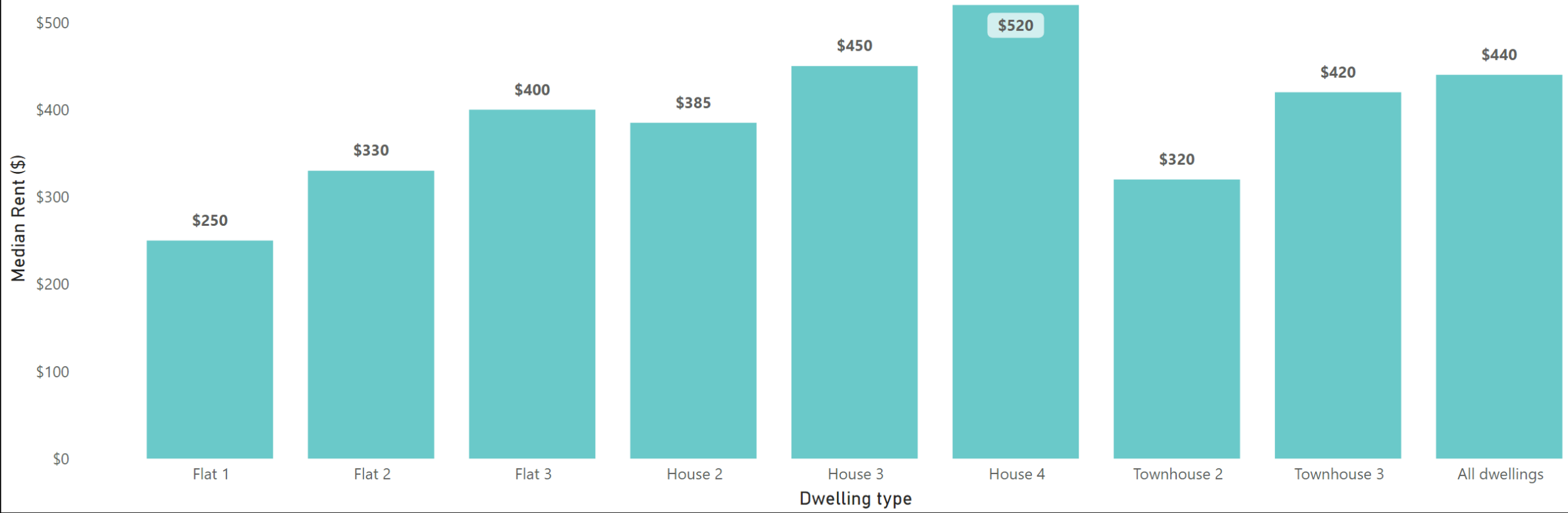

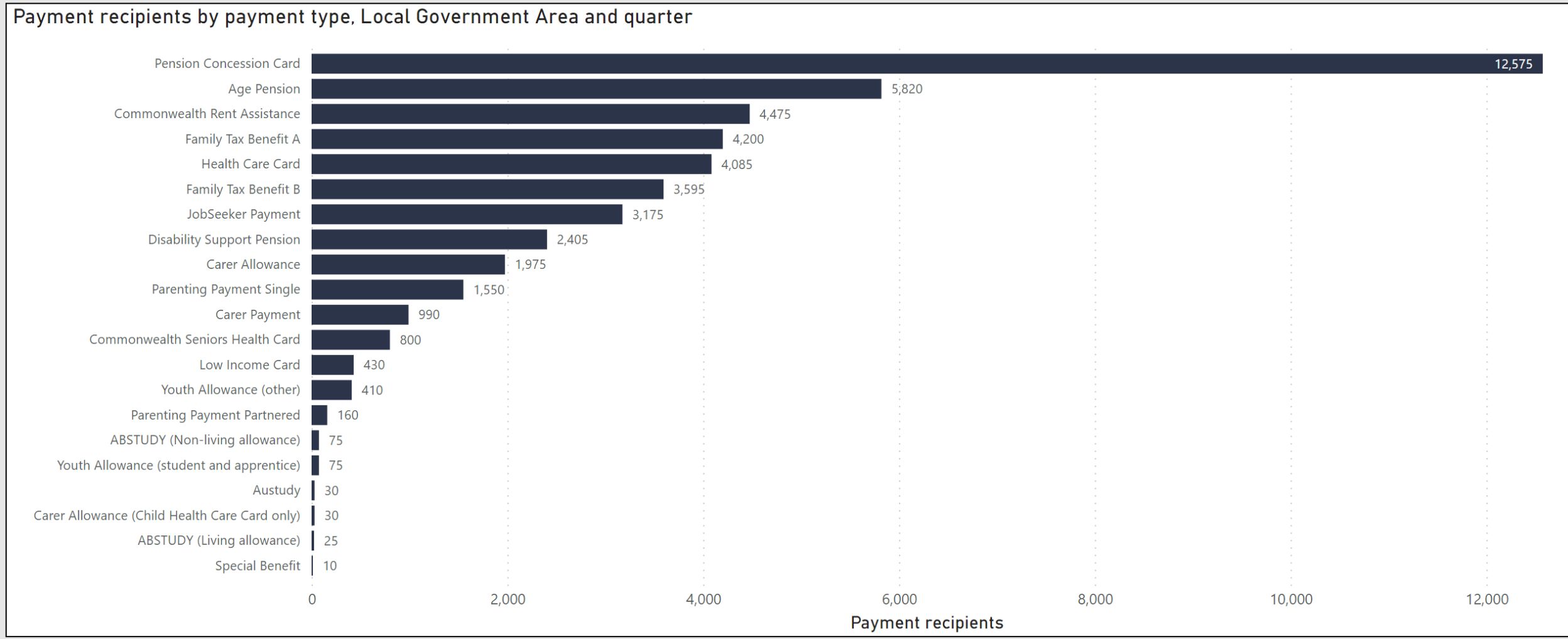

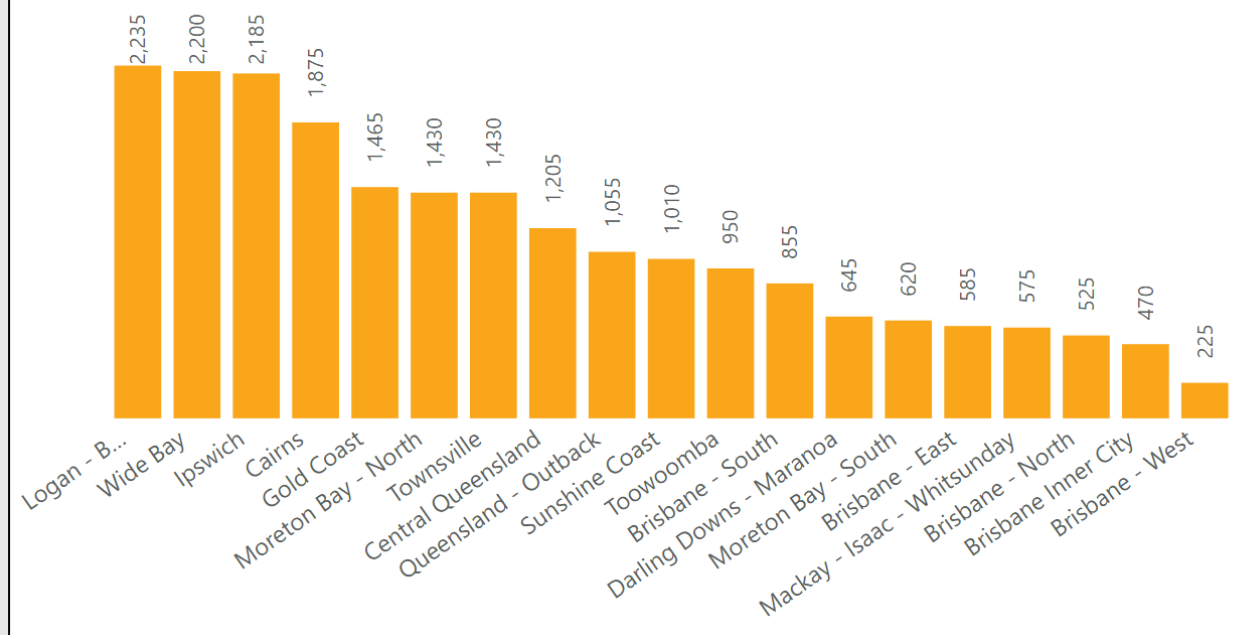

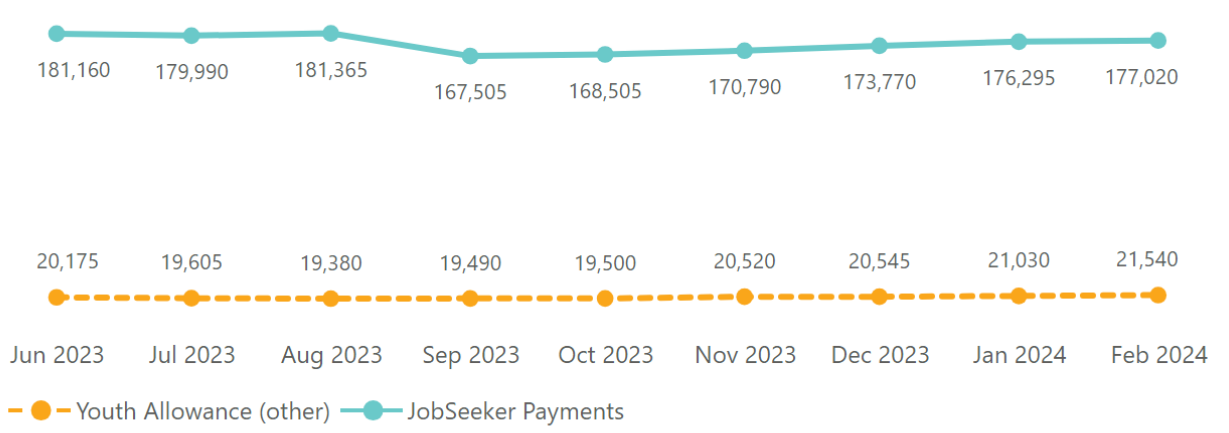
### JobSeeker Payment Recipients by SA4

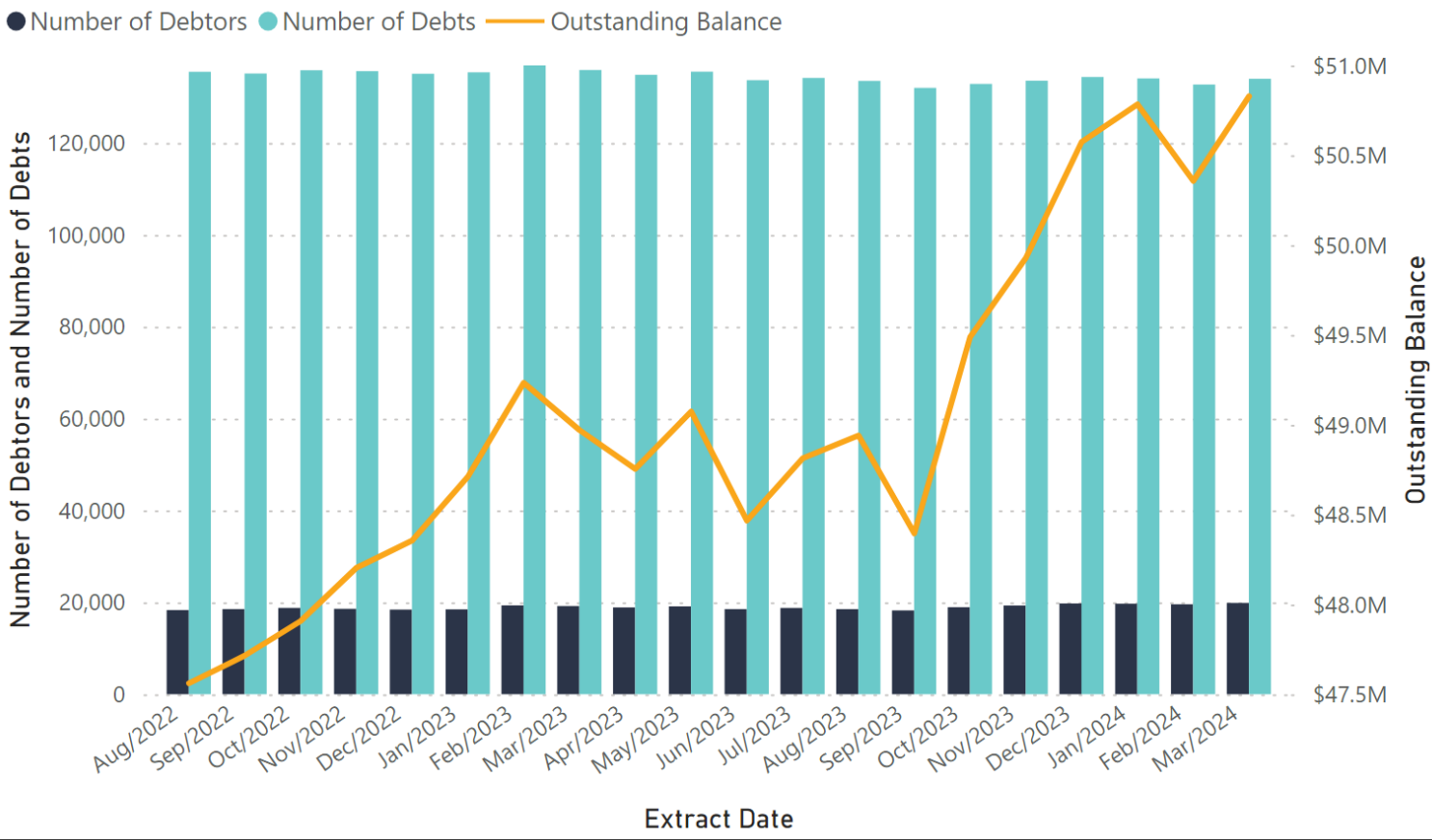

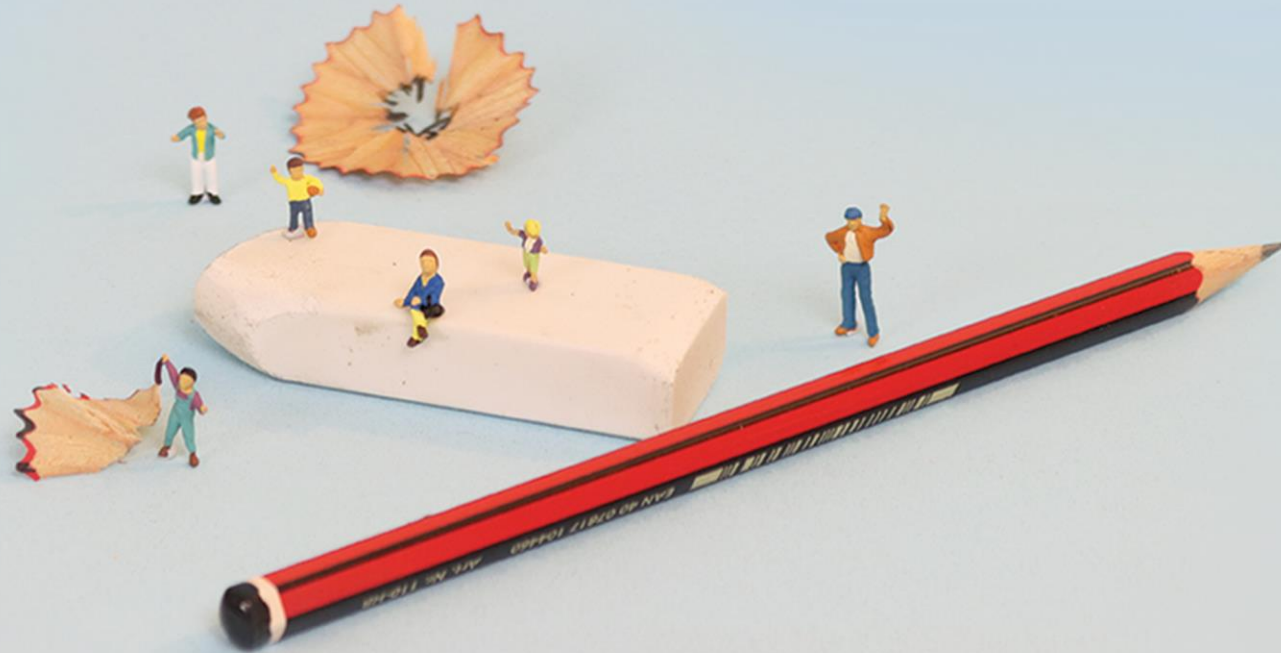

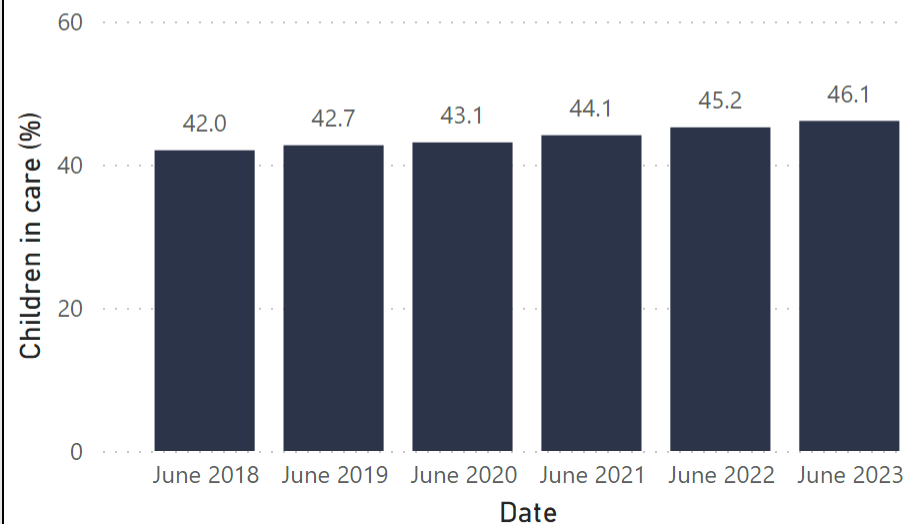

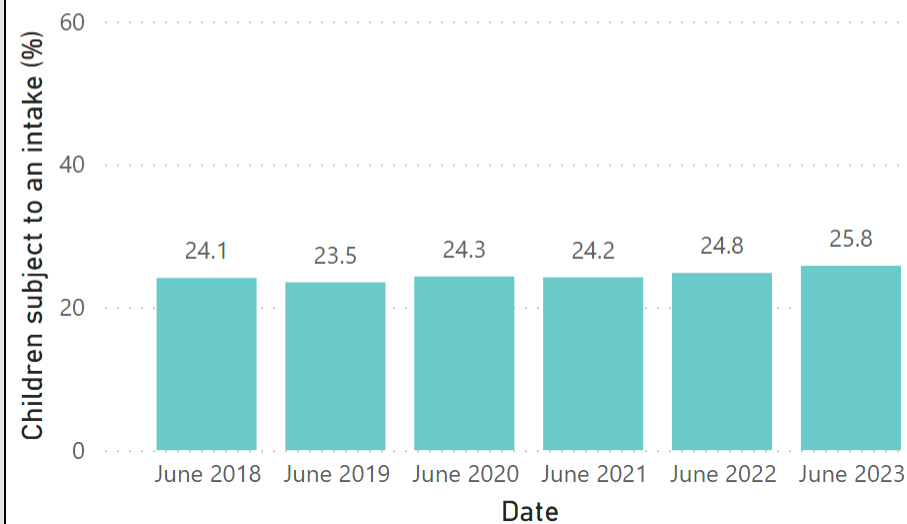


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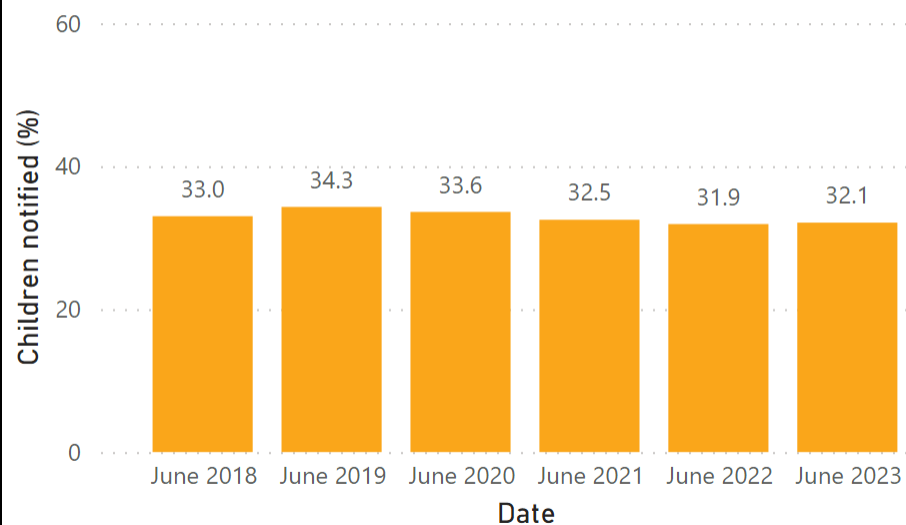
## Children in care who are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, by Financial Year



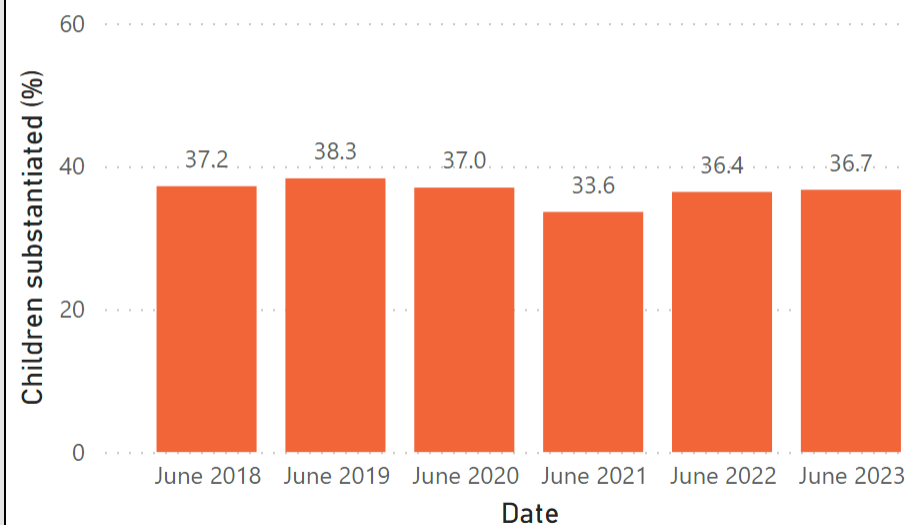
## Children subject to an intake that were Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, by Financial Year

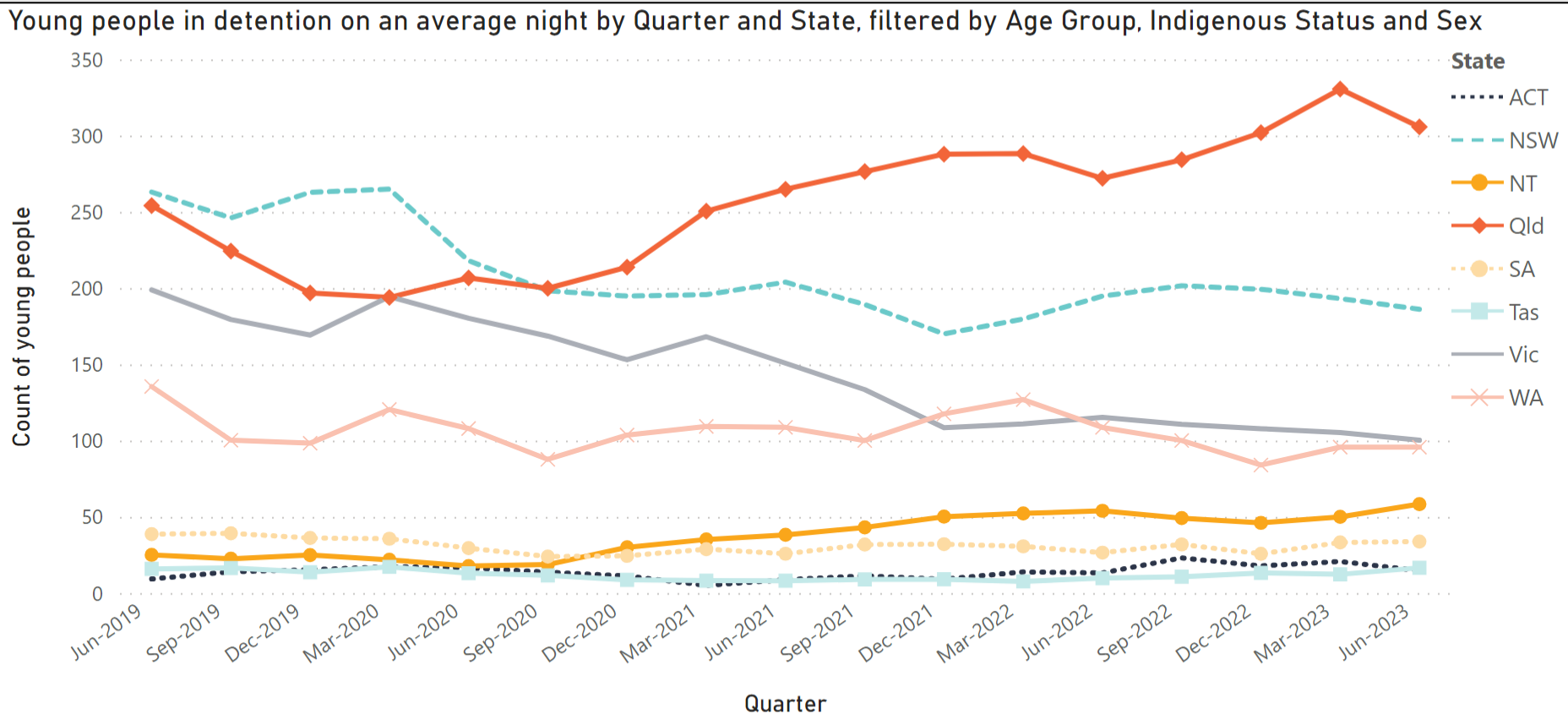

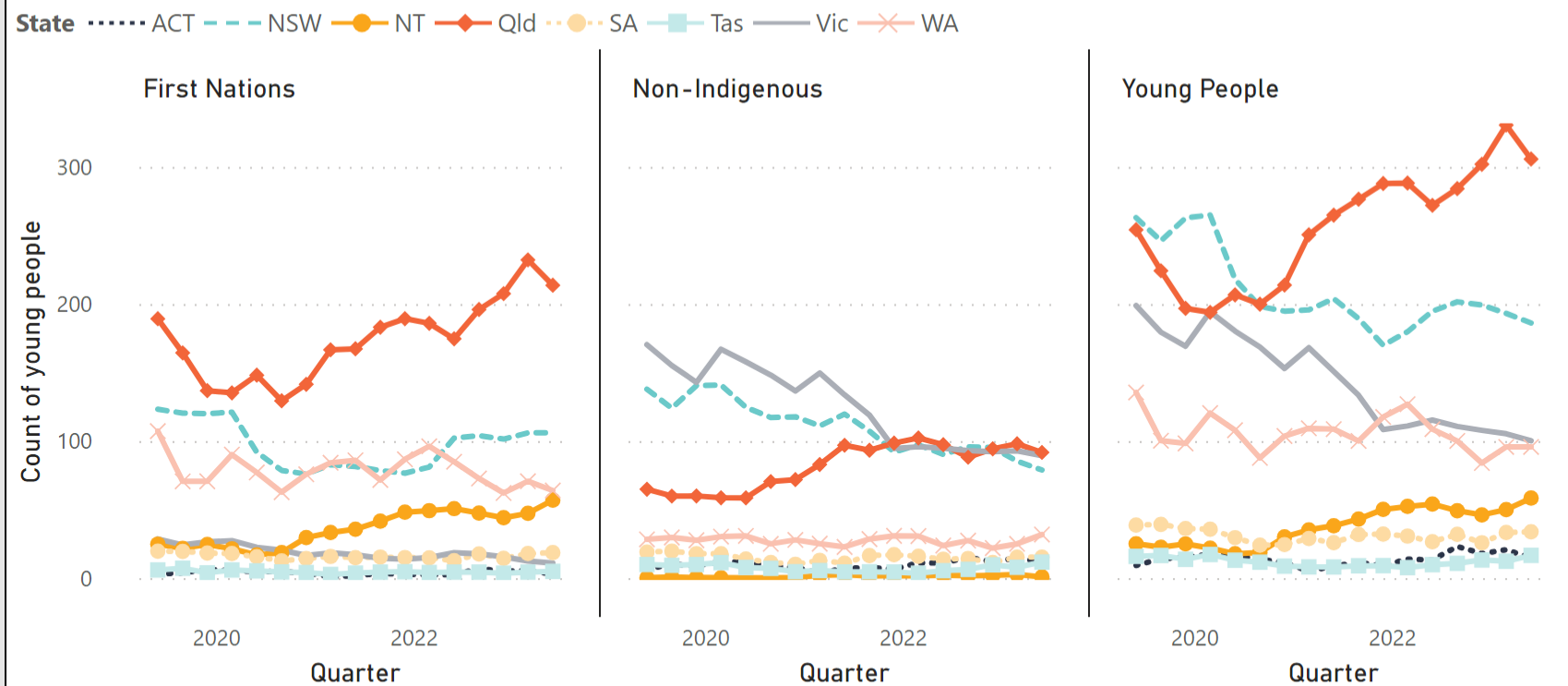
