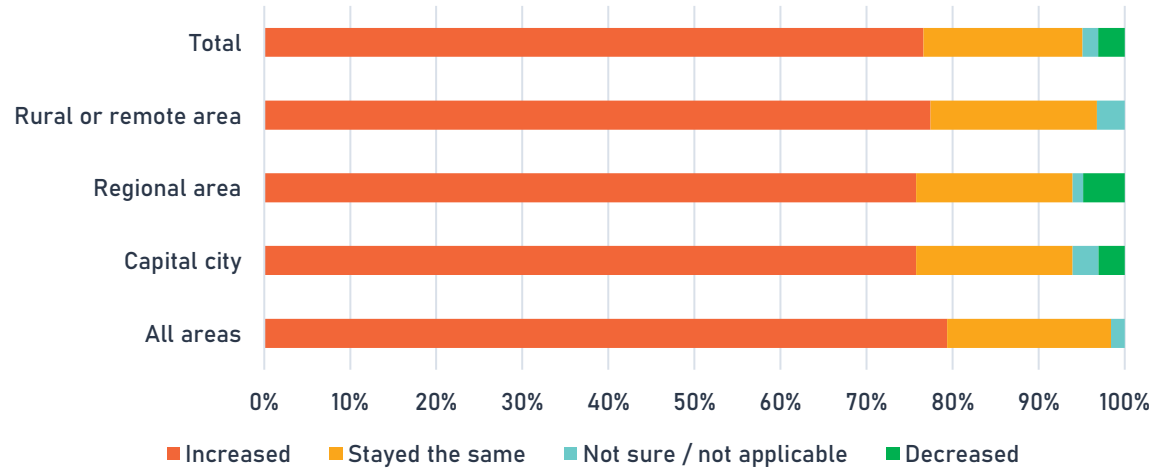

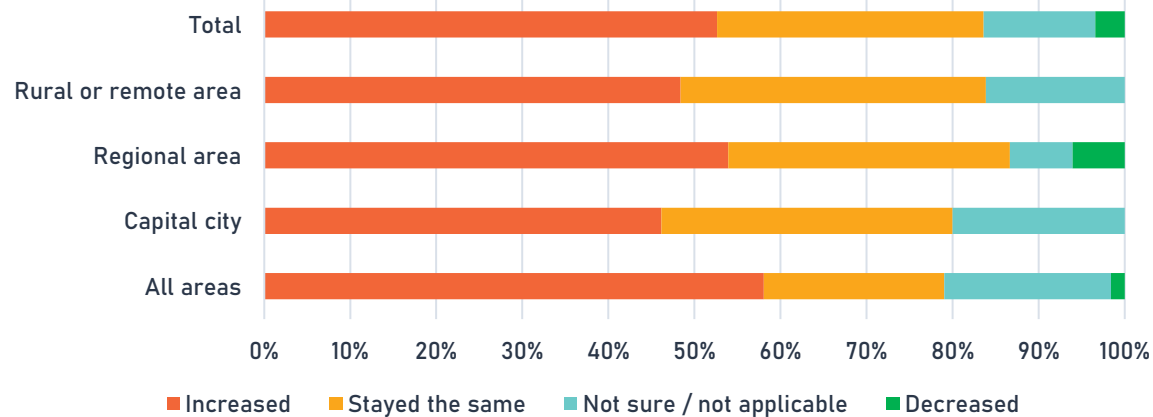
Complexity of need



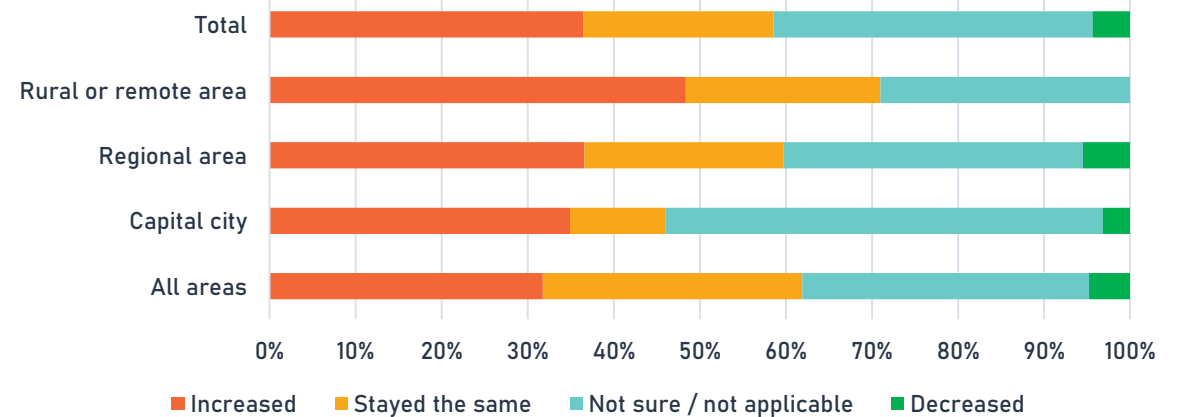
Difficulties keeping services properly staffed

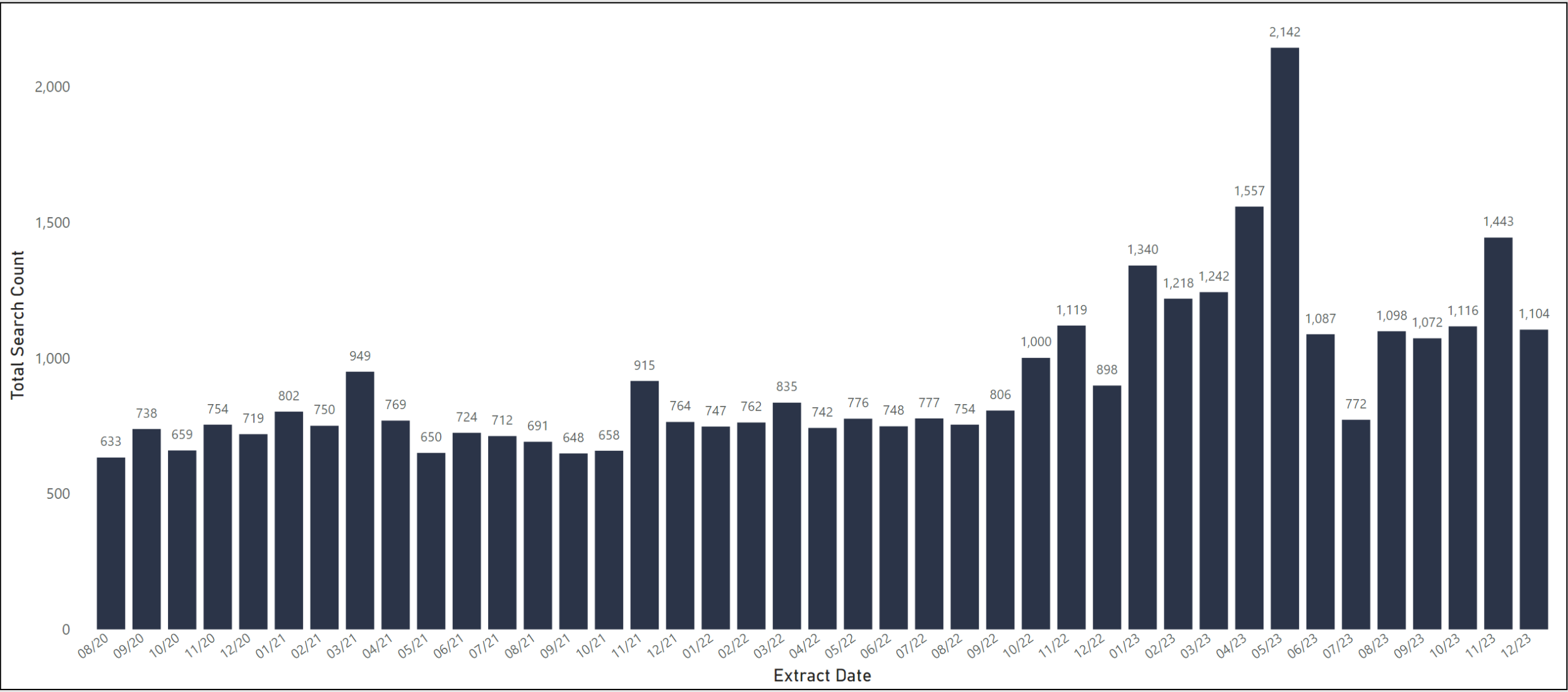

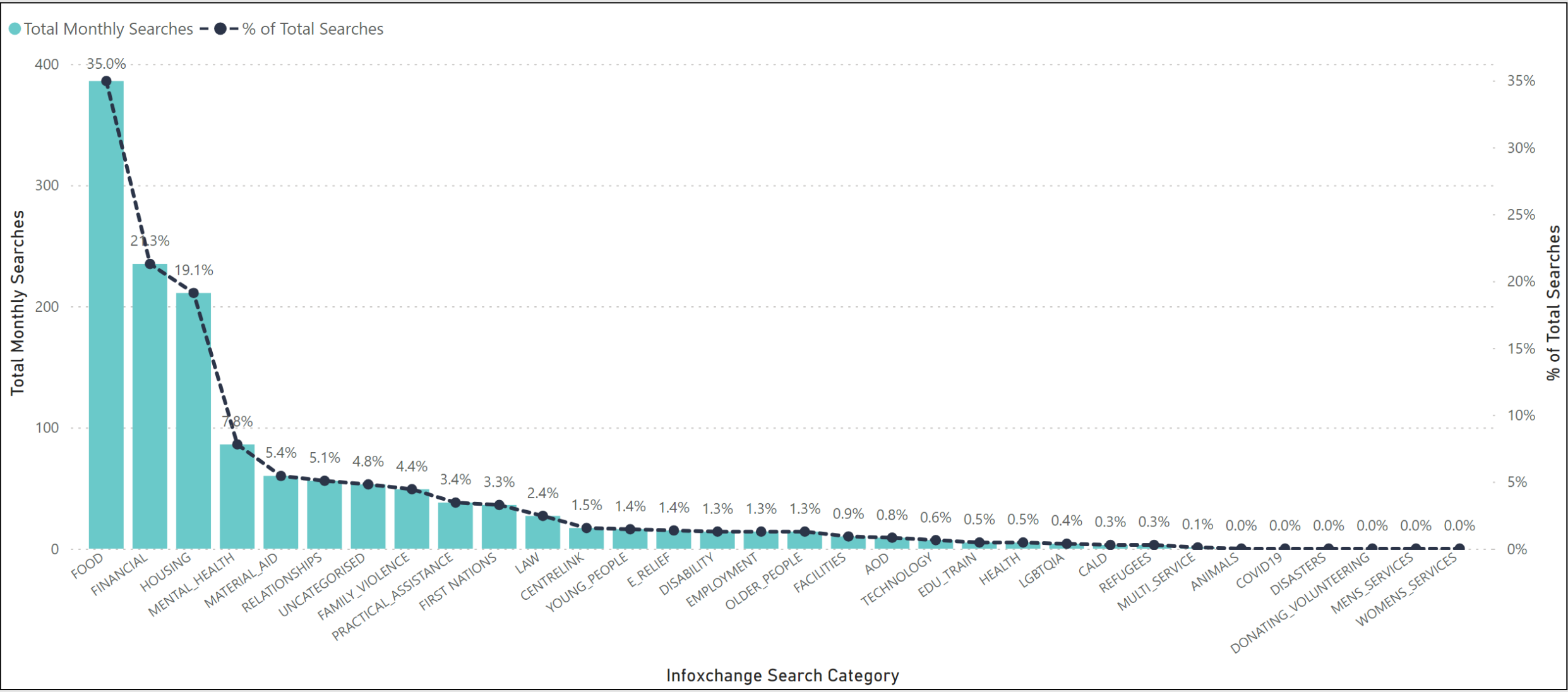

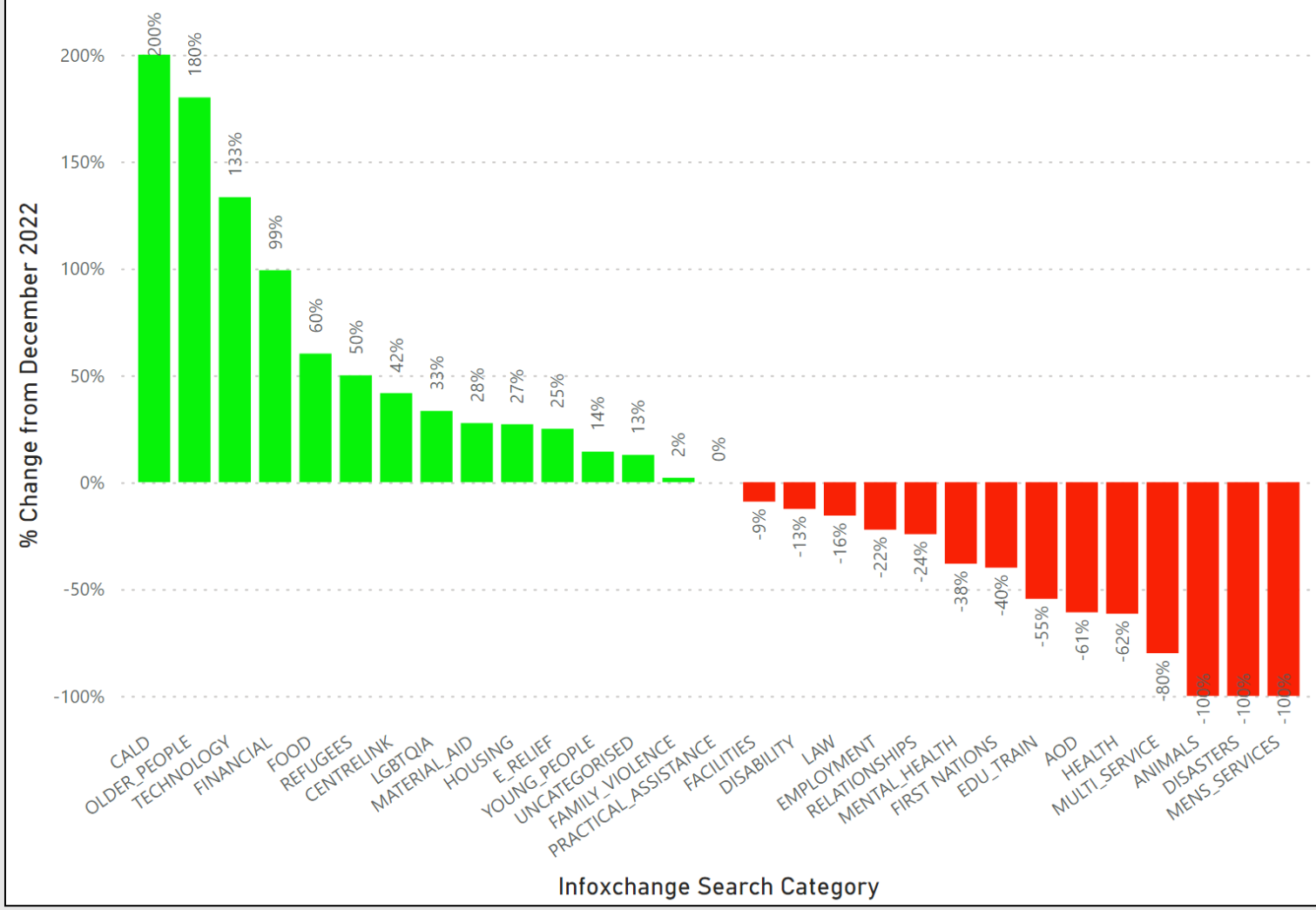

Total Monthly Searches Percentage Change by Search Category Over the Last 12 months



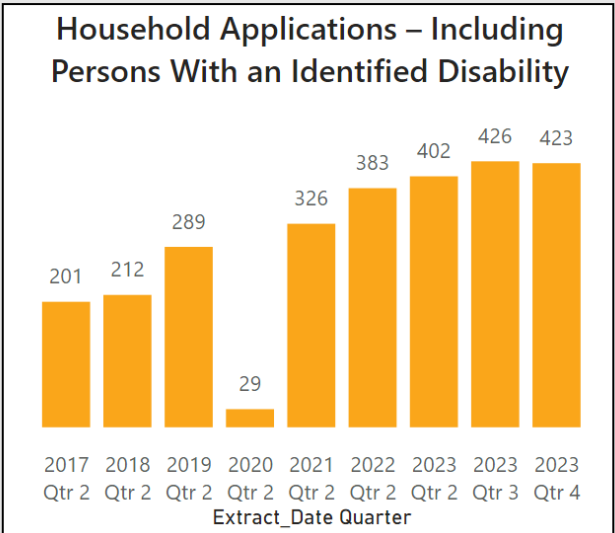
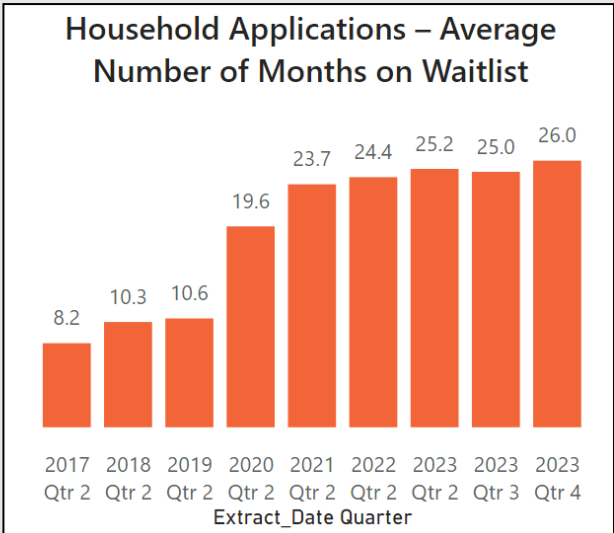
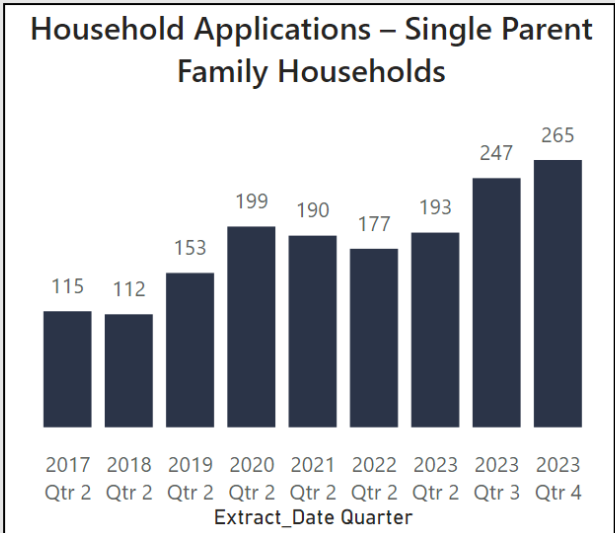
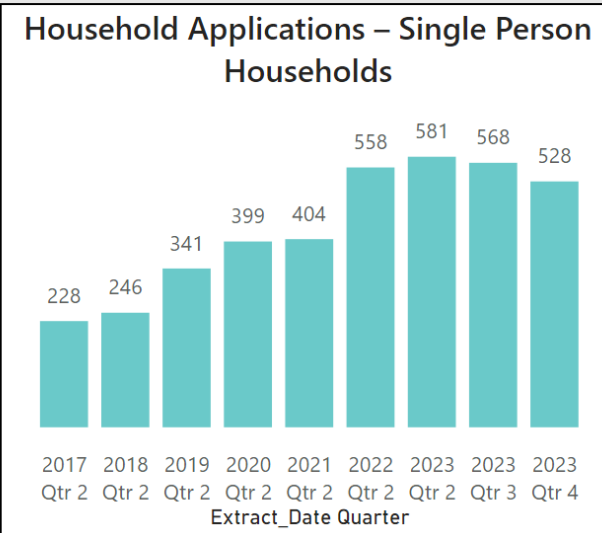
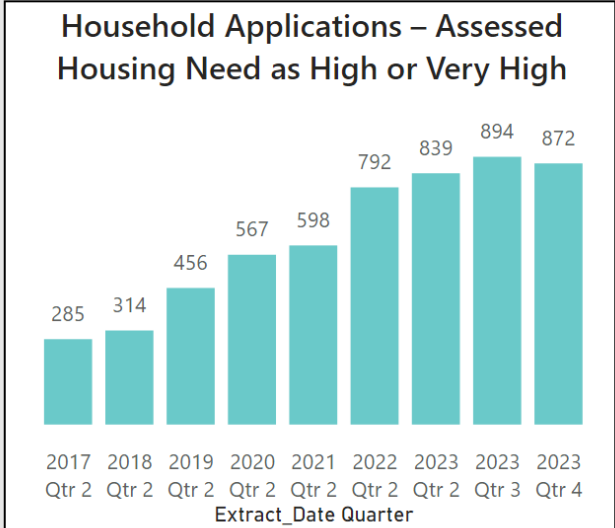
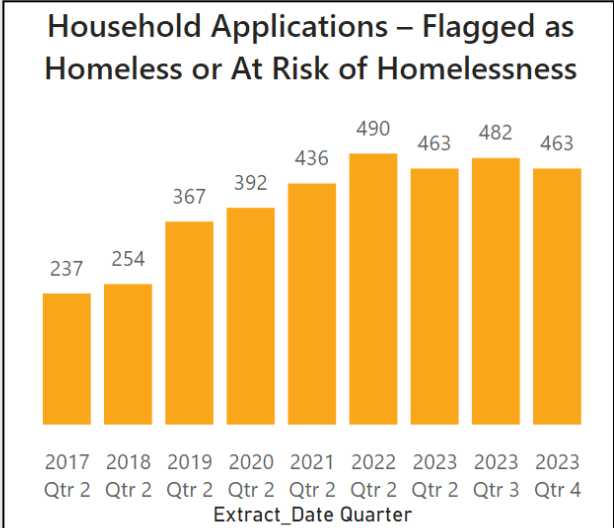
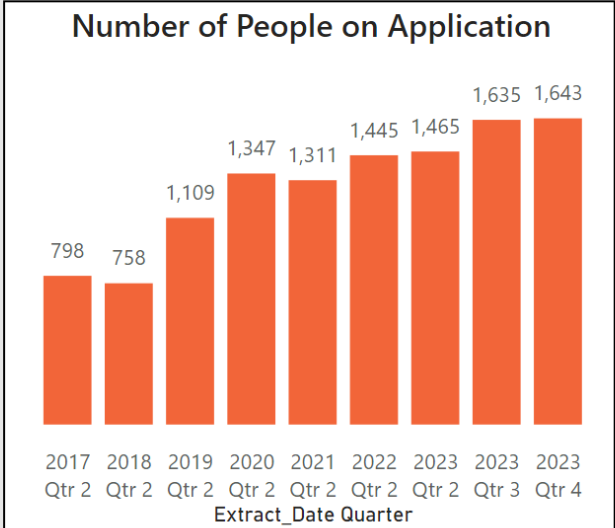
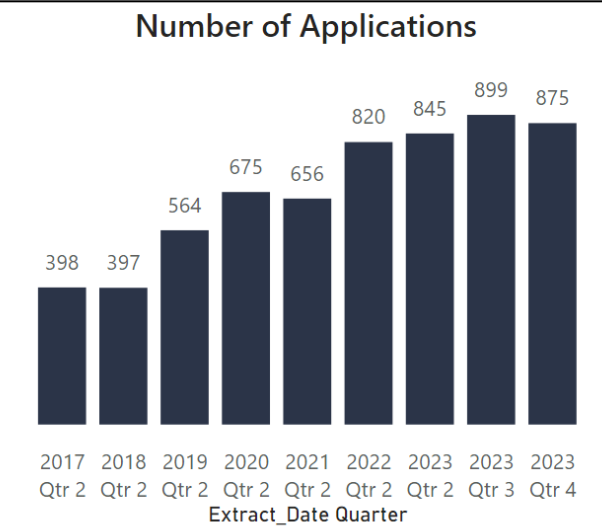

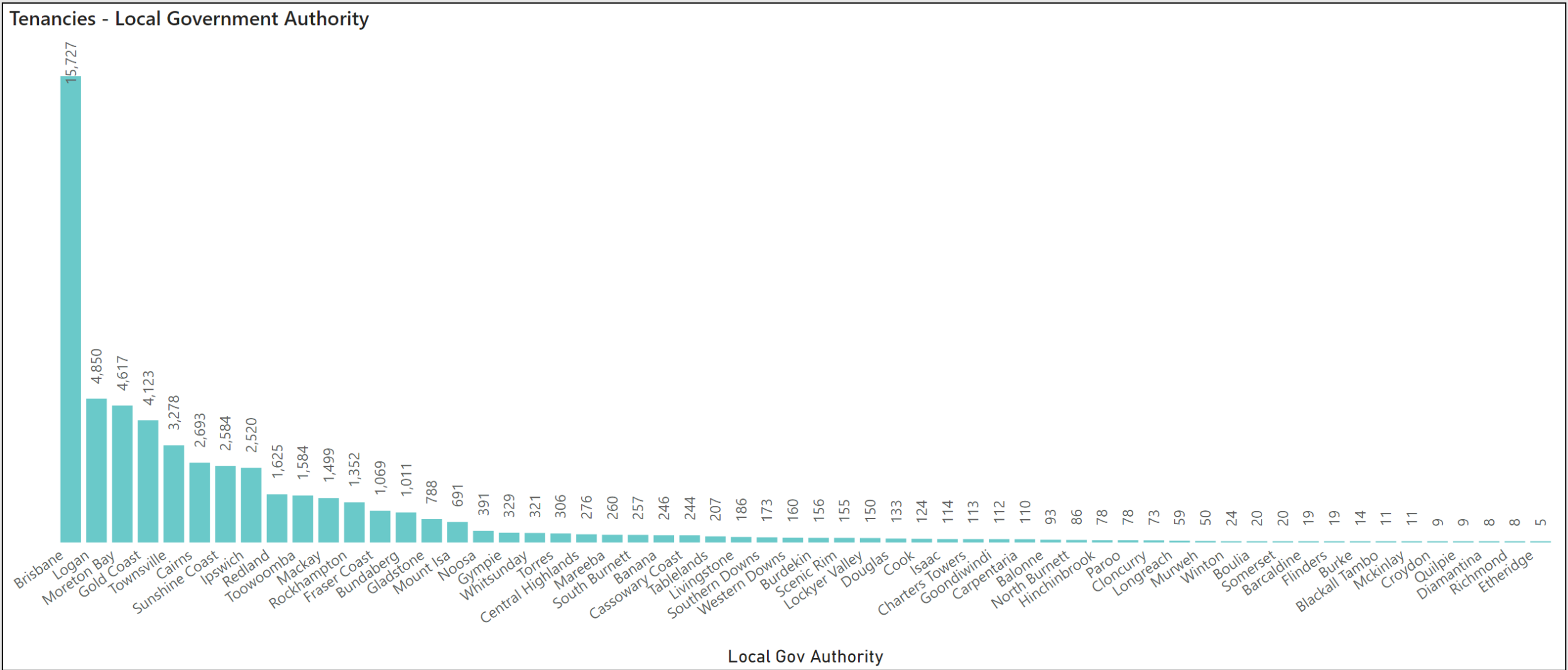

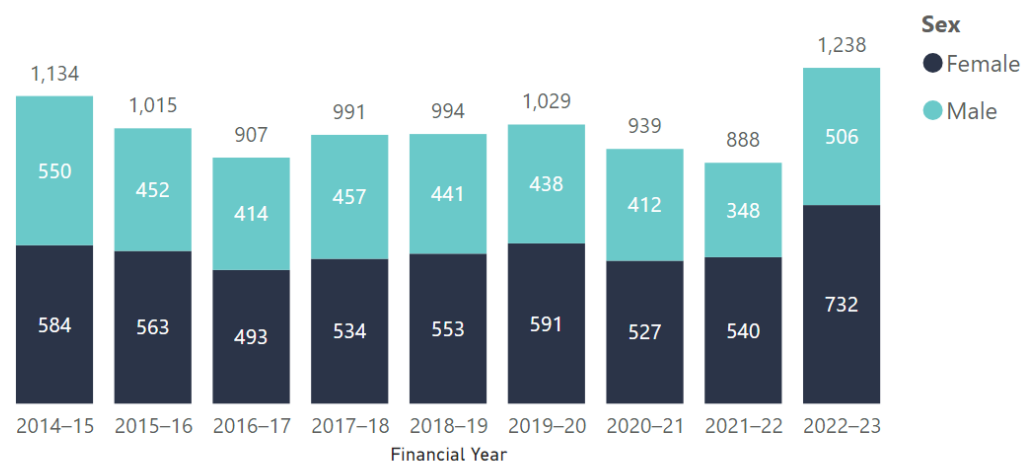
Count by Age group and Sex

To minimise the risk of identifying individuals, a technique known as perturbation has been applied to randomly adjust cells. For this reason, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals, and data may not match other published sources. Clients are assigned to a region based on where they lived in the week before presenting to an SHS agency. Clients are assigned to only one region, based on the location details provided in their first support period in the reference year. Yearly client counts should not be summed to derive longitudinal client counts because clients can access services in multiple years. 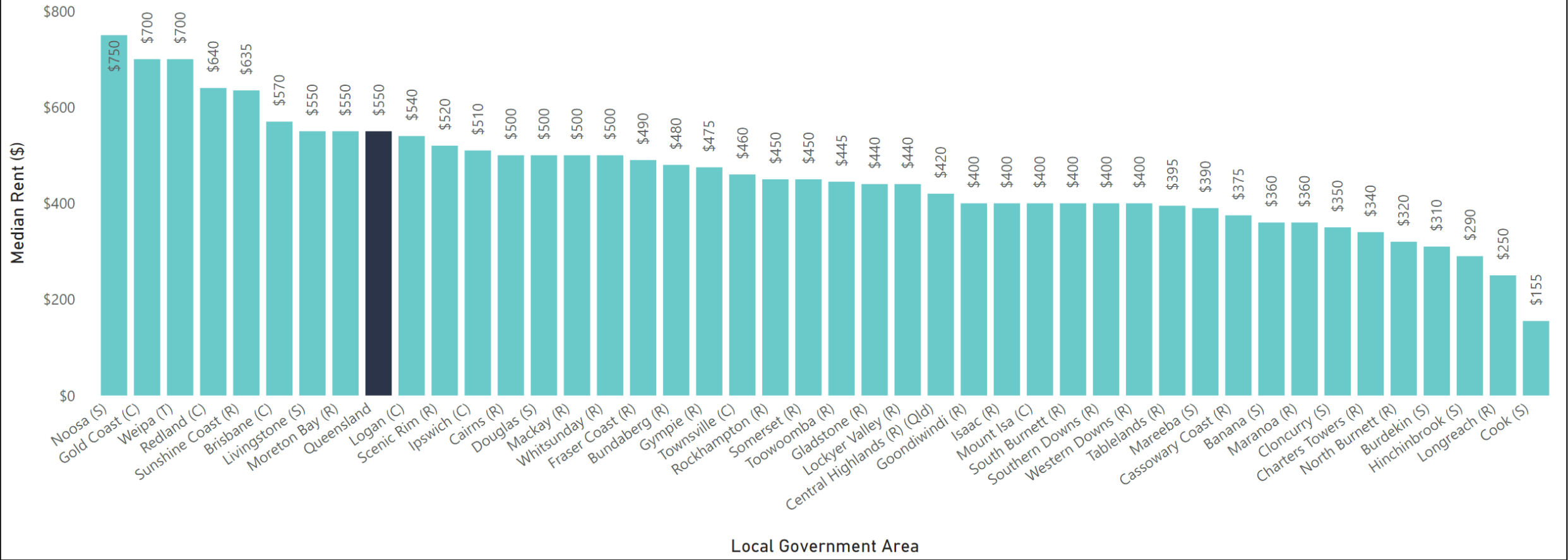
Median Rent by LGA and Dwelling Type

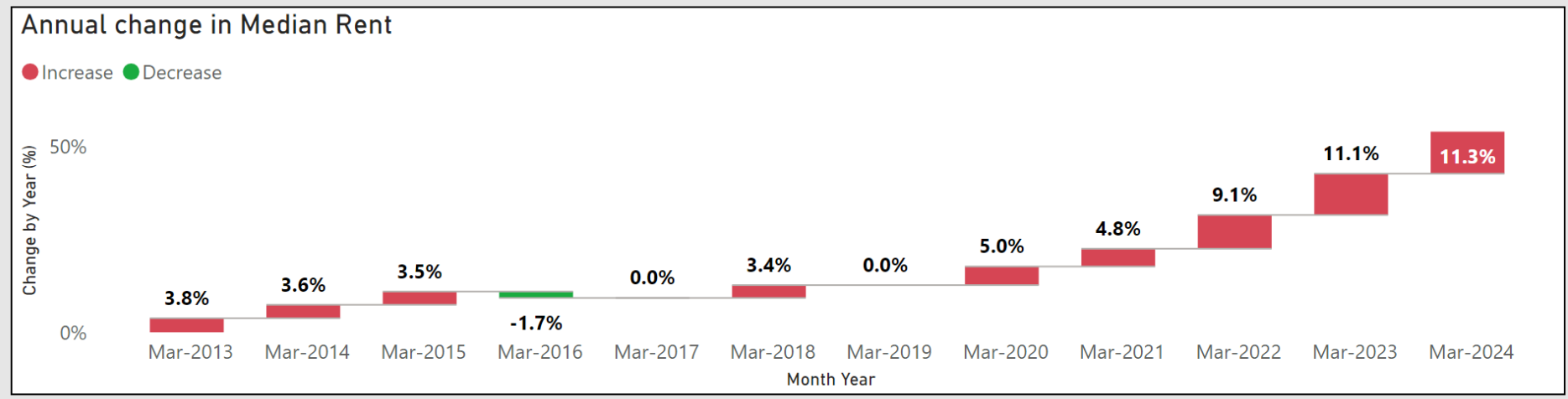

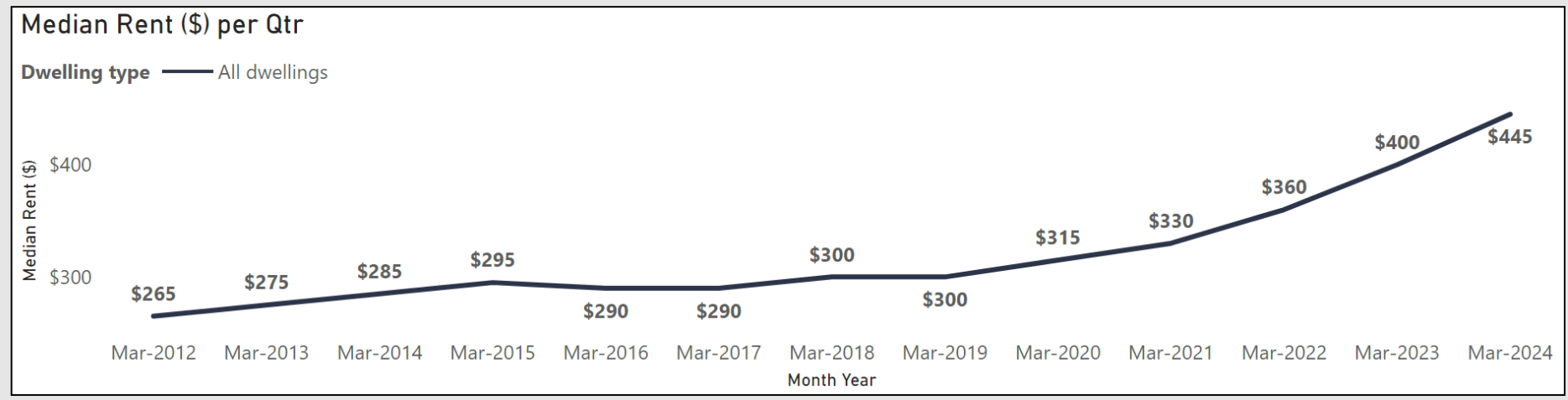

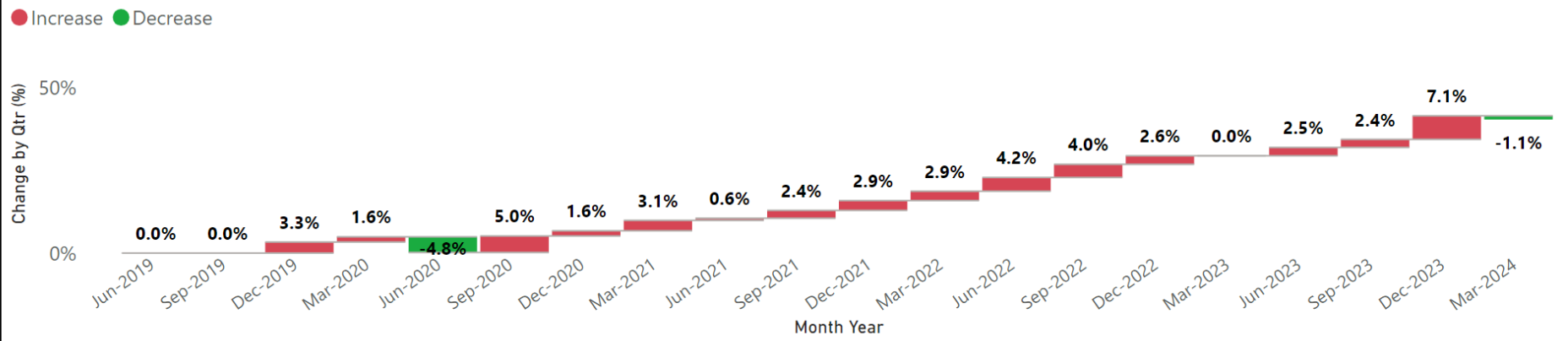

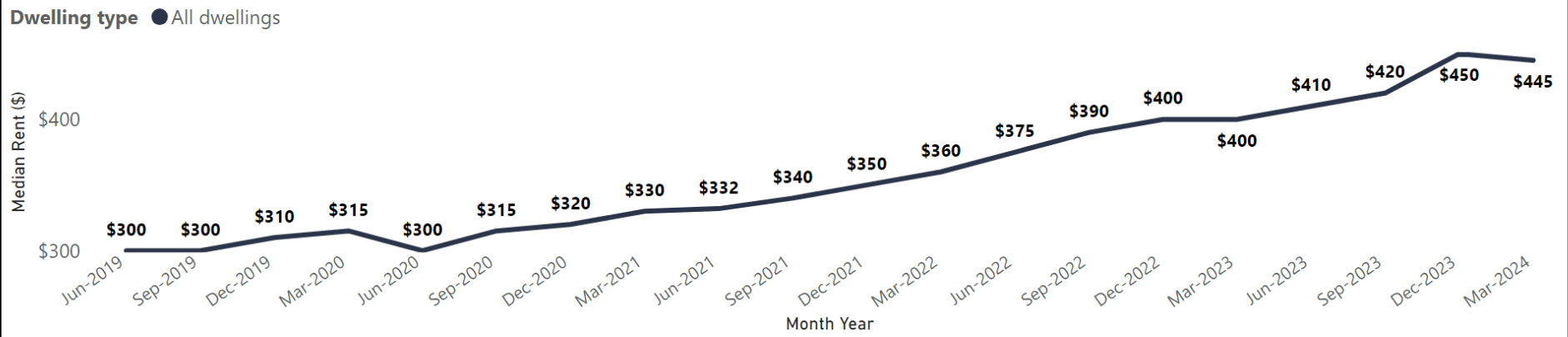

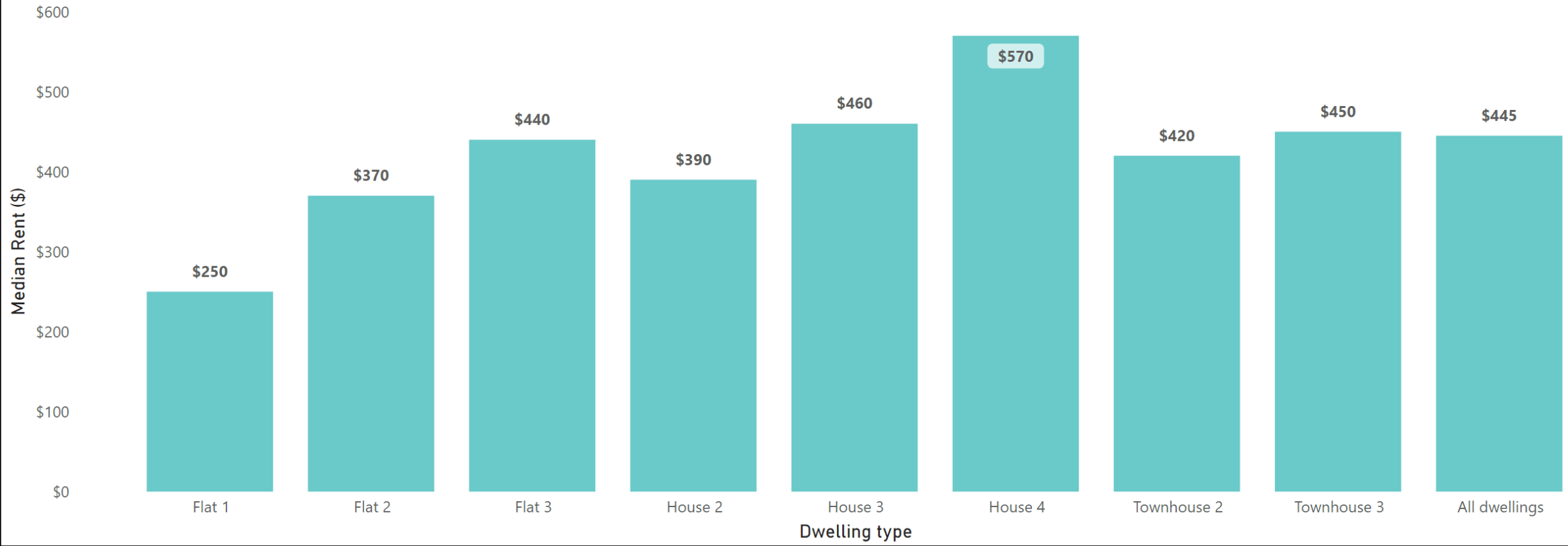

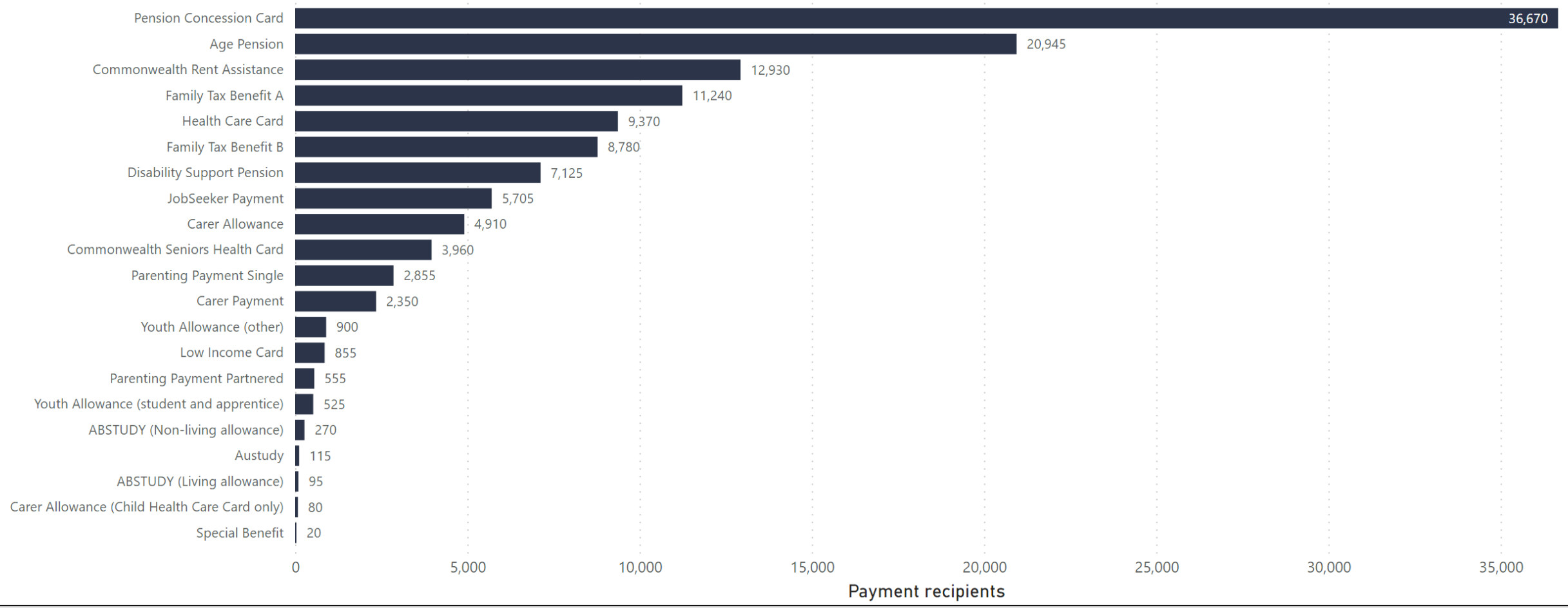

Payment recipients by payment type, Local Government Area and quarter



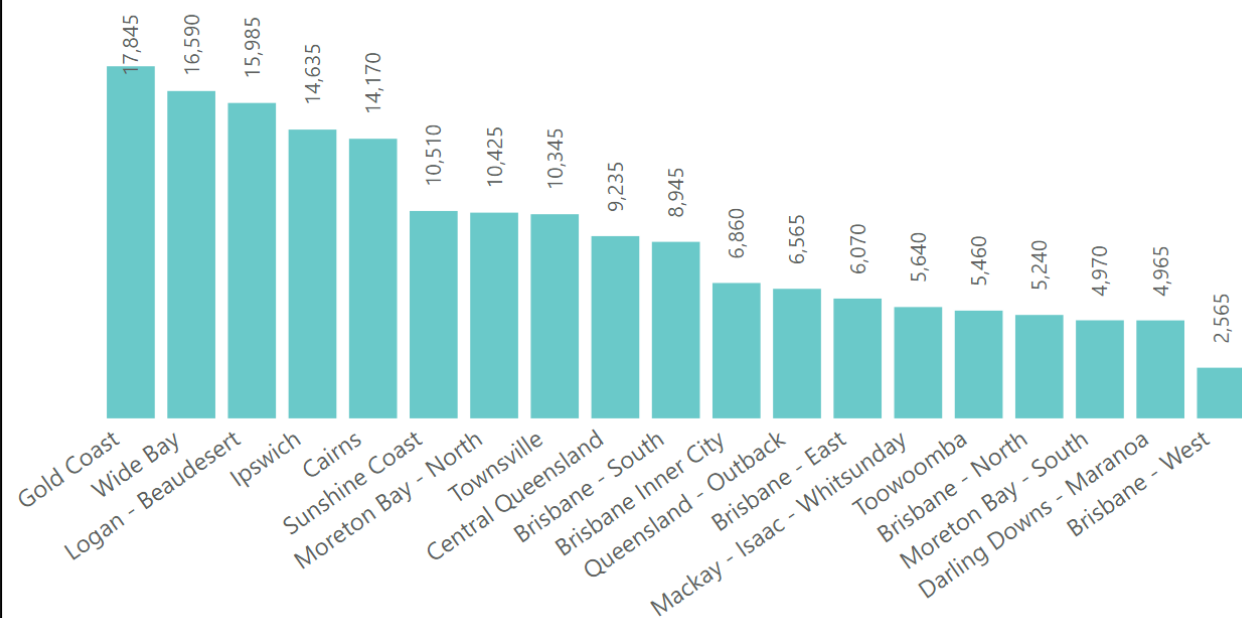

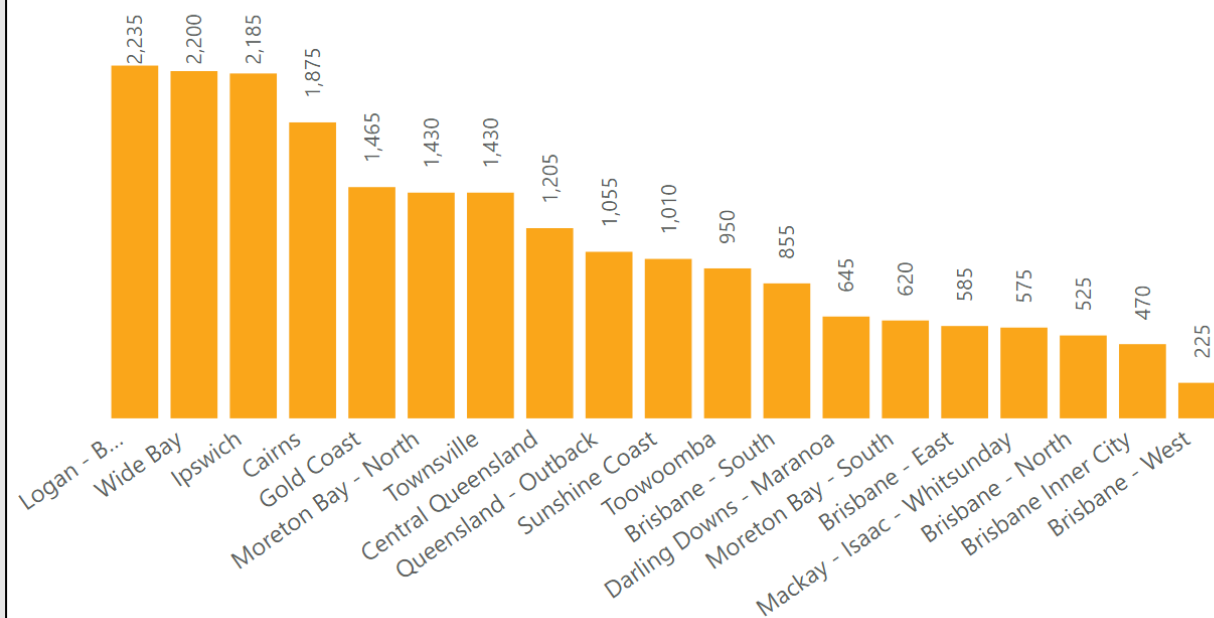

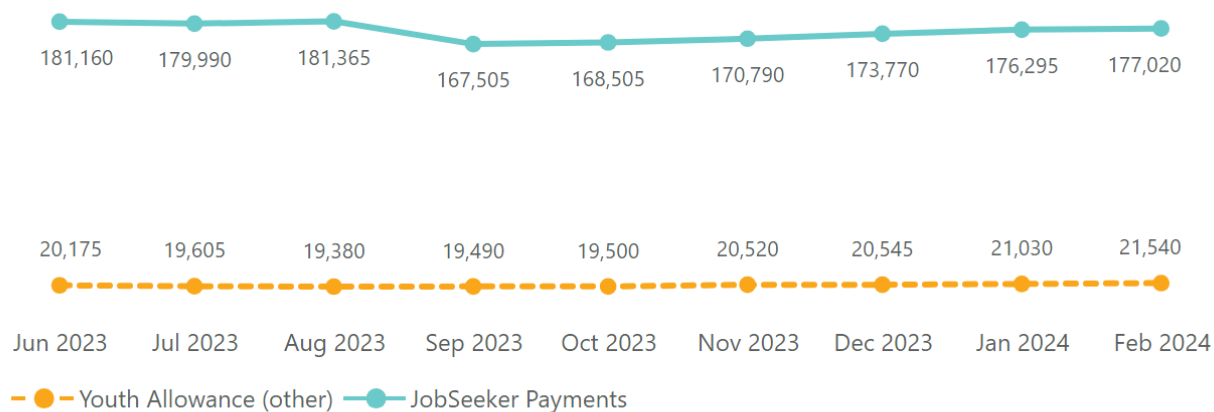
JobSeeker Payment Recipients by SA4

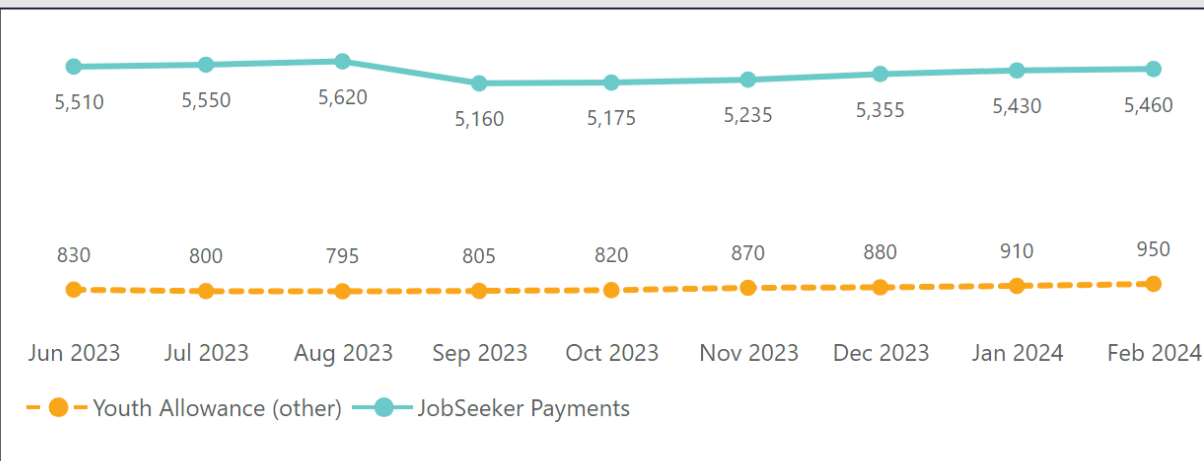

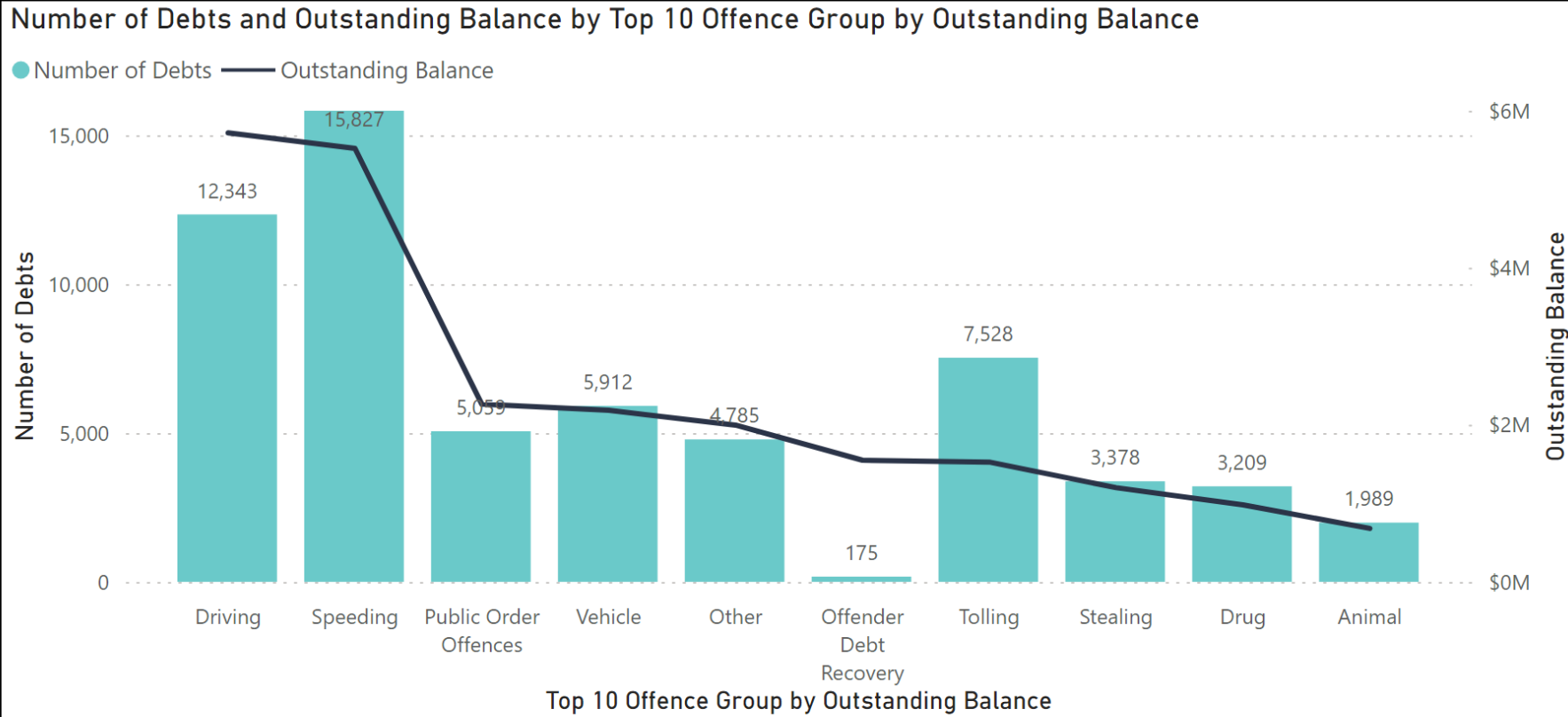

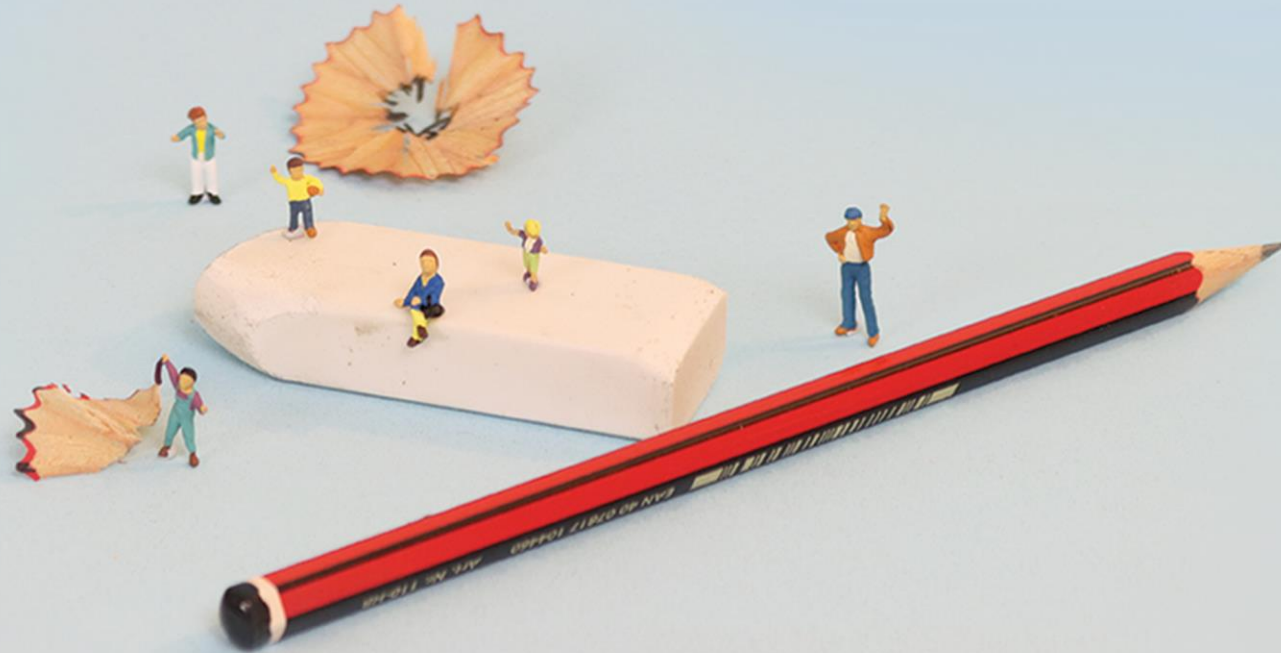


2) Average debt of hardship program participants

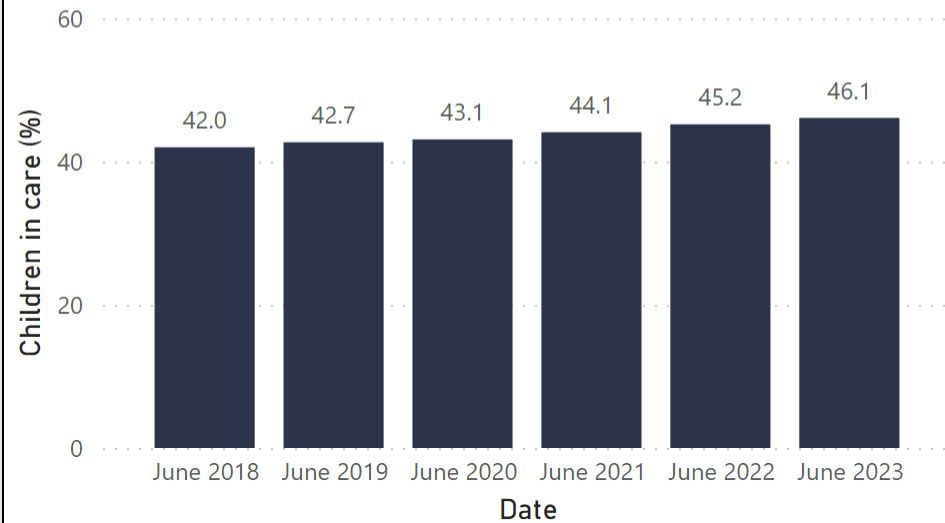

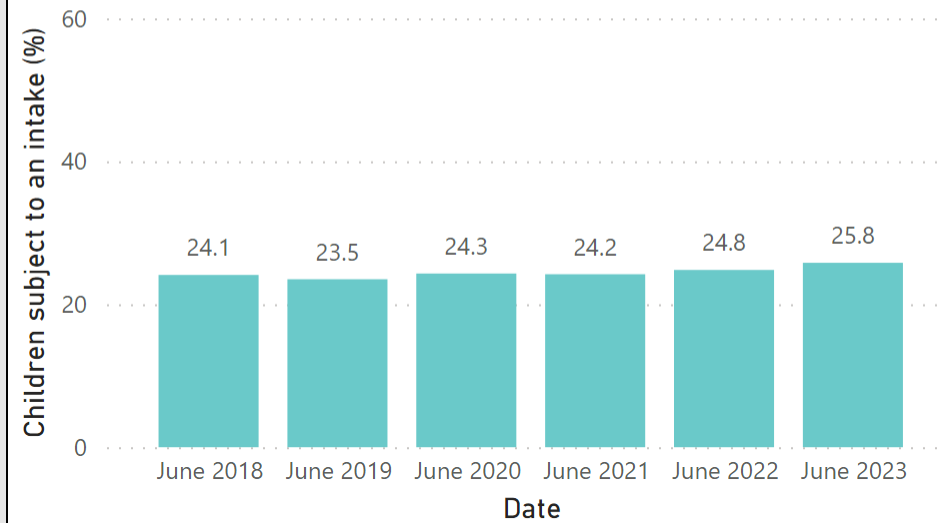

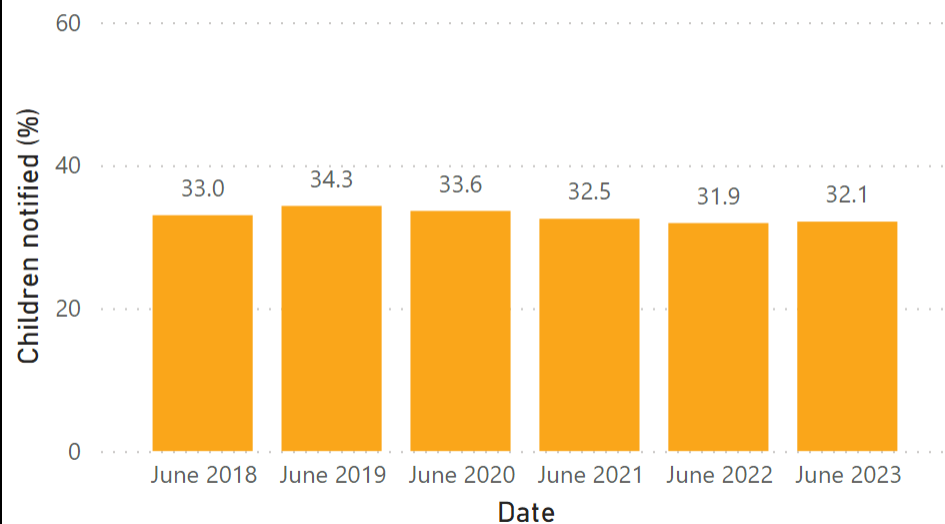
Children in care who are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, by Financial Year



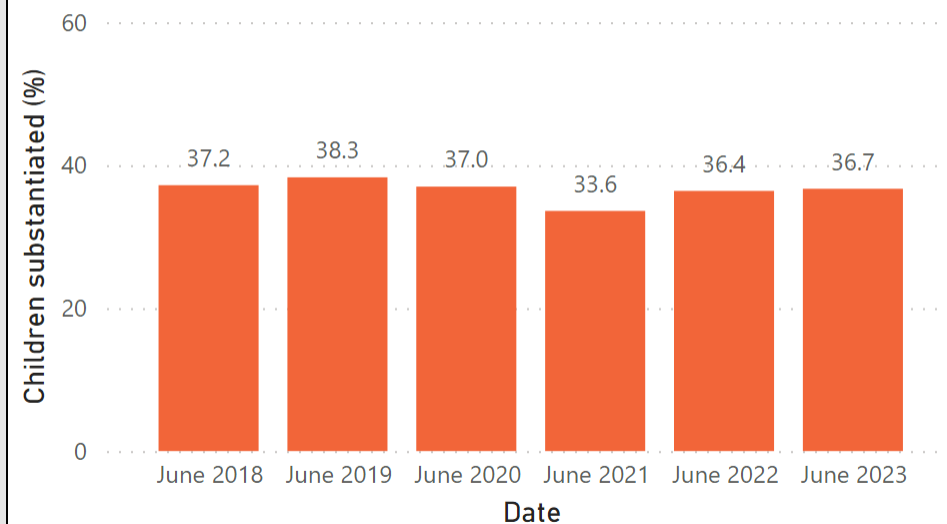
Children subject to an intake that were Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, by Financial Year

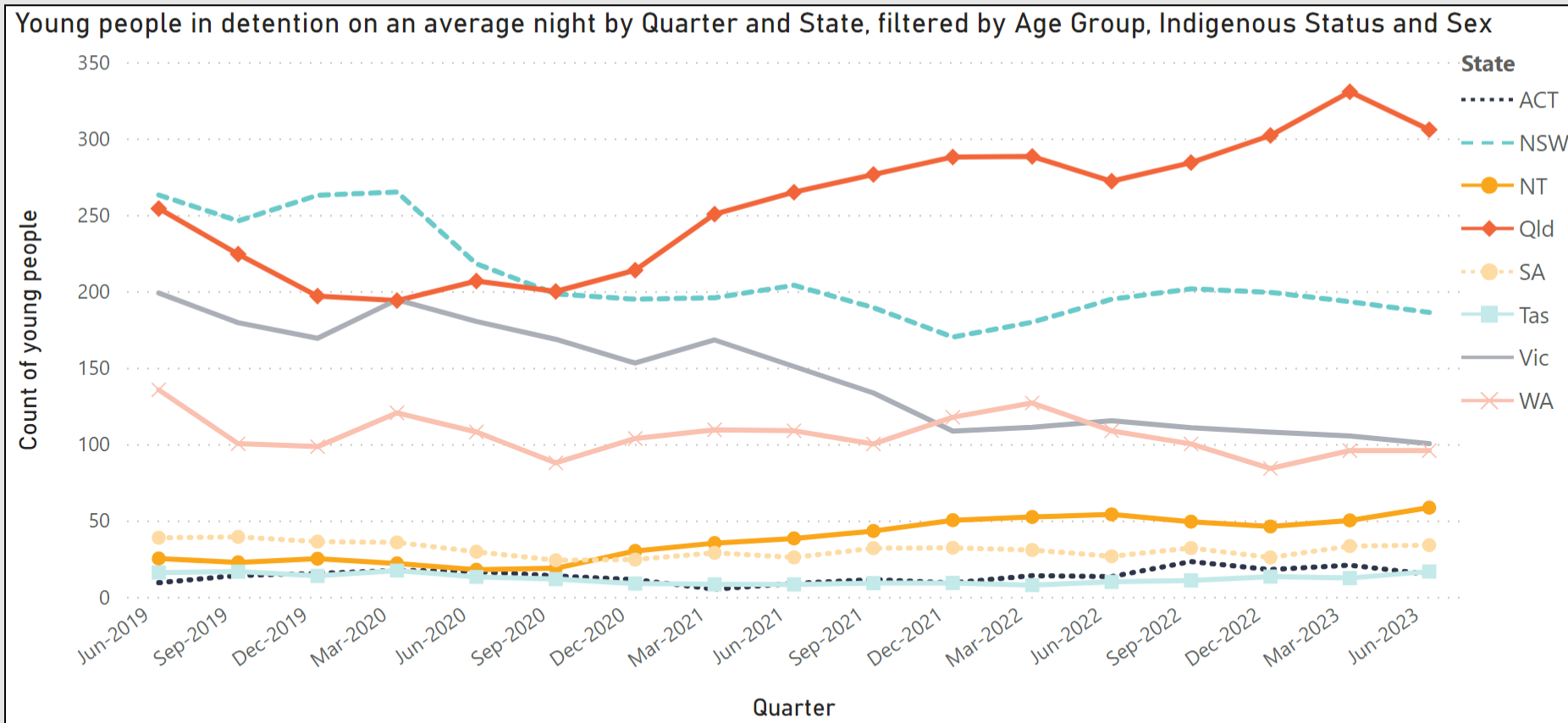

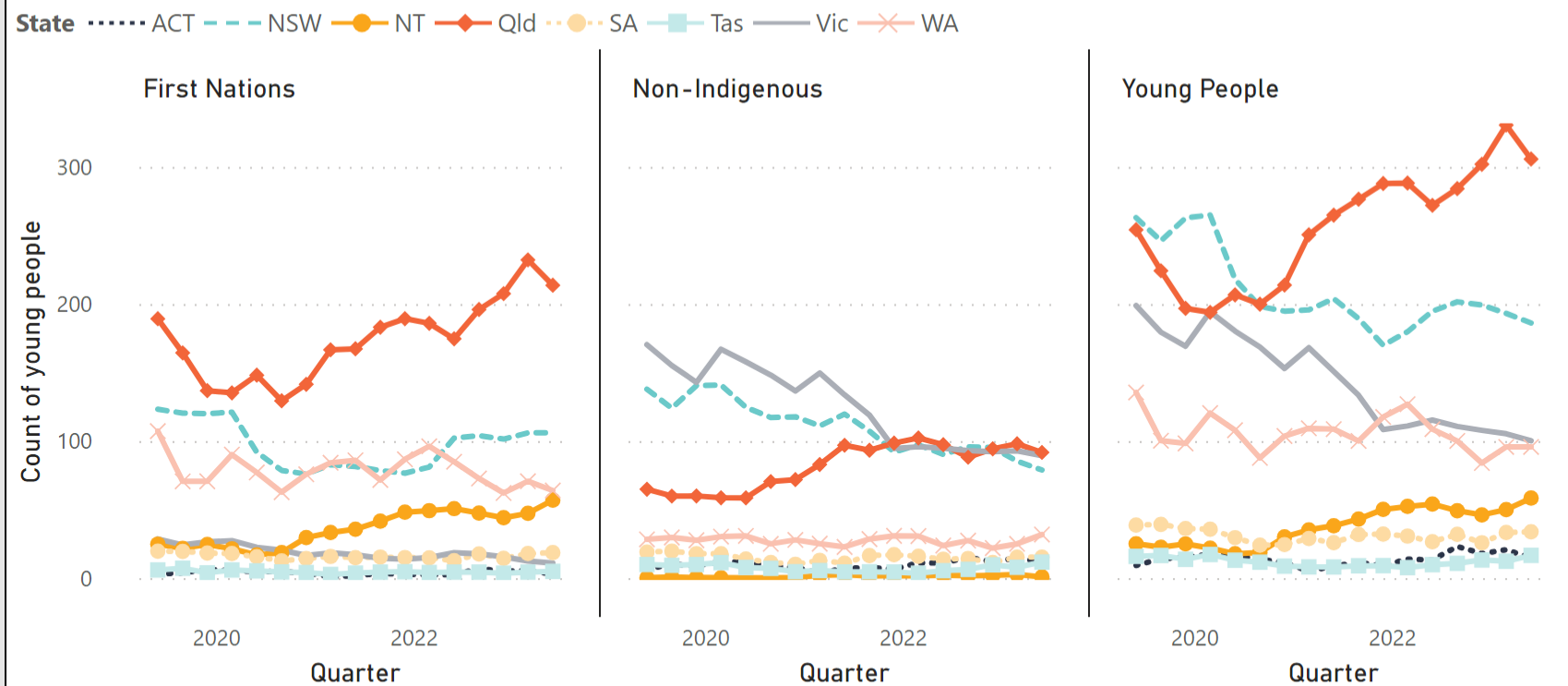
